The Gift of Being Heard

I think a combination of things has led me this week to think a lot about listening, and what a gift it is when people care enough truly to hear what we're trying to say. In my reflection for Pentecost Sunday yesterday, I talked about a poem I came across last week that says Pentecost is all about listening. The poet, a Methodist pastor named **Steve Garnaas-Holmes**, says the Pentecost story is one in which

[W]e learn one another's languages.

We embrace diversity, and learn to listen to each other,
to see from another's perspective,
to give voice to a life other than our own,
to make central a language that's not our own,
to communicate grace that's not on our own terms.

We acknowledge the differences in our lives,
honor one another's various home places and cultures,
and cross over the boundaries of comfort and familiarity.

Pentecost is a time when we surprise folks who aren't in the mainstream of U.S. life and culture by coming to them as people who want to learn how they see the world, and who ask them to help us understand how they experience this city, this neighborhood, this workplace, this church. We who often do much of the talking surprise them by genuinely listening to them.

A second thing that has led me to contemplate listening: Soon after I moved to Columbus in 2017, I was invited to join a men's group that had been meeting every Thursday night for seven years. The group is still going, and the members are my closest friends here. We recently enjoyed a 2-1/2-day retreat. Aside from hikes, cooking together, singing, and playing pool (if any of you would ever like to give me lessons so I don't totally embarrass myself the next time I play, by all means let me know...), we listened to each other. Each of us was given a chance to talk about something we were dealing with in our lives that we wanted the group's wisdom around. After we'd described that, group members responded with questions and observations that called us to go deeper into the issue than any of us could have on our own. The group honored each of us 90 minutes of undivided attention. We made love real for each other in ways I think almost all of us long for.

BREAD Nehemiah Action Coming May 21

The BREAD Nehemiah Action is coming up soon on **Tuesday, May 21**, beginning at 6:40 p.m. at the Celeste Center on the State Fairgrounds. The free tickets are available from RLC BREAD Network members or sign up online. Redeemer's goal for the Nehemiah Action is 60 members and friends to help achieve the BREAD goal of 2,500 attendees. According to Redeemer BREAD Network member **Kristi Hildebrand**, "Action attendance crucial for impact. When we follow up, they follow through."

Child care will be provided and parking is free.

Highlights of BREAD's achievements:

- a. Tree protection ordinance passed by City Council.
- b. Launch of Columbus Violence Reduction initiative, reducing murders significantly. **Pastor Dave** hosted CVR team talk in April for Adult Education Class. Here's the link to the YouTube recording: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=K2CRuC7oQbI>
- c. Training 800 Columbus City Schools staff in restorative practices.
- d. The CPD police chief is seeking a grant for ABLE training.

This year BREAD is seeking the following:

- \$60 million in ARP funding for affordable housing.
- Addressing predatory landlords who are raising rents drastically.
- Support for non-police crisis response teams for mental health emergencies.

Donate to 2024 Youth Gathering Yard Sale!

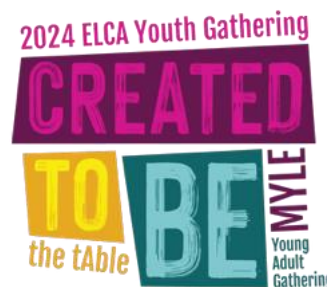

Adult Ed Class Discusses ELCA Draft on 'Living Our Faith as Citizens'

In this season of the BREAD Nehemiah Action on May 21, Memorial Day, and elections, it's timely to ask the question, "How as Lutherans should we understand our relationship to civic life — including government — as individuals and as a church body?"

An Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) task force led by experts in theological ethics has been addressing this question for the past three years. This group has issued "A Draft Social Statement on Civic Life and Faith." For the next couple of Sunday mornings, our adult education class will read through a summary of this statement and discuss what it says about faith and public life. Any who wish can submit comments and suggestions to the task force until **Monday, Sept. 30**.

Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long- term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Recently, members of one of WCK's relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthansen** writes, "Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an

opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. For more information on World Central Kitchen look them up at <https://wck.org> .”

Being Good Stewards of Earth #3

Michele Disbro asks, “Do you recycle right?”

1. The triangular recycling symbol ♻️ does NOT mean an item is recyclable; the number in the middle just indicates what type of plastic it is. For example, the black plastic food containers that typically have a 5 in the center are not recyclable nor are SOLO cups. Check here with questions: <https://recycleright.org/recycle-reuse-search-tool/>
2. Do not put plastic bags in with the recycling. They get caught in the machines. Take them to a store drop-off along with other stretchy plastic.
3. Clamshells for salads and berries are not recyclable.
4. Remove the metal lids from the glass jars but keep the plastic lids on the plastic bottles.
5. Do not recycle items with contamination. A little grease on cardboard is fine but tear off places with food remnants stuck to it.
6. Aluminum foil, pie tins, and basting pans are not recyclable.
7. Shredded paper should be put in a see-through plastic bag (only exception to rule #2).

Finally, last Wednesday would have been Mom’s 98th birthday. That day, I thought about her five+ decades as a clinical psychologist. I remembered all her friends who, over the years, told me, “Your mom was the best listener I’ve ever known.” When I was in social work graduate school, I asked Mom if there was a piece of writing that helped guide her work with clients. Without having to think about it at all, she sent me a quote from the psychologist **Carl Rogers**. It is a love song to the art, gift, and risk of listening:

I have often noticed that the more deeply I hear the meanings of a person, the more there is that happens. Almost always, when a person realizes he has been deeply heard, his eyes moisten. I think in some real sense he is weeping for joy. It is as though he were saying, “Thank God, somebody heard me. Someone knows what it’s like to be me.” In such moments, I have had the fantasy of a prisoner in a dungeon, tapping out day after day a Morse code message, “Does anybody hear me? Is anybody there?” And finally, one day he hears some faint tapplings which spell out, “Yes.” By that one simple response he is released from his loneliness; he has become a human being again. There are many, many people living in private dungeons today, people who give no evidence of it whatsoever on the outside, where you have to listen very sharply to hear the faint messages from the dungeon.

If you’d like an experience of listening and being listened to, there’s still time to be part of our first clearness committee at Redeemer. **Rich Pautsch** and I described this in the April 8 *Reflections*. Each gathering will be a time for someone to talk about something in their lives they’re unclear about. The rest of the group listens, and asks open-ended questions whose sole purpose is to help the person understand themselves better, and clear away some of whatever obstacles are keeping them stuck. It’s a remarkable act of compassion that moves us more deeply to understand each other. Let Rich or me know if you’re interested in being part of a first gathering, which will be held soon.

Years ago I said to a friend who had been there for me during a particularly hard season in my life, “You are listening me into healing.” I know of few things that make “love your neighbor as you love yourself” more real than the experience of someone giving us their total attention, time, and presence, and responding in ways that show us they have heard, and show us we have been heard.

The Southern Ohio Synod will hold its annual Synod Assembly on **Friday and Saturday, May 31-June 1** at Peace Lutheran Church in Dayton. Redeemer’s delegates are **Scott Steiner** and **Wendy Stoica**. **Pastor Dave** also attends.

This year the theme is “Out of the Waters ... Follow Me.”

Gaza and Palestine Update

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

- The floating pier than was constructed by the U.S. military is now being used to take humanitarian aid to Gaza.
- The southern crossings remain closed by Israel which prohibits aid trucks from going into southern Gaza.
- Aid is not and has not exceeded the daily humanitarian aid that entered Gaza prior to the Israeli bombardment of Gaza.
- Virtually everyone in Gaza is now dependent on humanitarian aid for food and water.
- While **President Biden** continues to pause the shipment of 2,000-pound bombs to Israel, this week the administration advance \$1 billion of military aid to Israel.
- The death toll has exceeded 35,000 with up to 70 percent of those killed being women and children.

Please pray for peace and advocate for a ceasefire in Gaza.

26 Holy Trinity Sunday Nicodemus came to Jesus with questions about faith, baptism and the kingdom of God. Rather than snub his curiosity, Jesus took the time to speak with him. What questions do you have about faith and theology? Share your uncertainties with God, trusting God to understand.
