

Wisdom from Another Tradition

Yesterday we had our second adult education discussion of a draft document from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. This document addresses the relationship between one's faith and how one gets involved in trying to make our society more loving and just. The conversations have been quite spirited. Yesterday over 25 took part.

A section of the document that generated a lot of passion yesterday had to do with the call of the 8th century BC Hebrew prophet, Micah, to "walk humbly with our God" (Micah 6.8). One of the ways the document says Lutherans can "walk humbly" is to know that Christians, as individuals or as the church, have no guaranteed higher or better reasoning than other people in religious or nonreligious communities" (Article 9). In matters of public policy, and life in general, we look to other peoples and traditions for wisdom.

Being married to a Buddhist leads me to explore practices from that tradition, which predates the birth of Jesus by some 400 years. One teaching I have been (trying) to practice is called tonglen, a Tibetan word that means "sending and taking." The Buddhist nun Pema Chodron, a true source of wisdom for me, describes tonglen as "being willing to take in the pain and suffering of ourselves and others and to send out happiness to us all." Chodron explains, "We breathe in what is painful and unwanted with the sincere wish that we and others could be free of suffering. As we do so, we drop the story line that goes along with the pain and feel the underlying energy. We completely open our hearts and minds to whatever arises. Exhaling, we send out relief from the pain with the intention that we and others be happy" (**The Places that Scare You**, p. 55).

To illustrate tonglen, I'll walk you through a time I practiced it last week.

I was with some friends. One person was talking about how lonely they were, and how much they envied people who are partnered, because they've never been able to sustain a long-term relationship, and are now in their 60s. As I listened, I found myself feeling little empathy. This seems to be a frequent refrain in their lives. At one point, I realized I'd stopped listening since I felt I'd heard it all before.

The next morning, as Mike and I sat down for the meditation time we do before he goes to work, I thought about my response to what this friend had said the evening before. I realized what I've realized before, but often conveniently forget: One of the reasons I let this person push my buttons is

Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long- term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Reflections

Recently, members of one of WCK's relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthausen** writes, "Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. Being Good Stewards of Earth #4: Ways to Compost Food Scraps

Michele Disbro asks, "Do you recycle right?

"Did you know that the Franklin County Landfill receives 1 million pounds of food EVERY day! That food can actually be composted and returned to the ground as nutrients. Some people compost food in their yards. Redeemer member, **Sue Yehling**, takes all of the inedible food scraps from the monthly food giveaways and the Saturday garden giveaways. She hauls the scraps to a compost pile on her property. Many of us do not have the space to set up a food compost in our yard and these food composting spots can often attract animals. (Sue has fun stories about watching animals drag away cracked open melons and squash, etc.) So how can we compost food at home?

"Buy a five-gallon bucket with a lid (available at hardware stores). Deposit any food scraps (including meat and bones if you're NOT composting in your own yard) into this bucket and store out of the way. You may want to keep it in your garage and empty it more often in the summer months because it will smell when you open the lid. You can buy green compostable bucket bags to line the bucket to make it easier to empty or be prepared to rinse out the bucket at times. Then simply take your bucket to one of the many free drop off sites as listed below. Rather than fill a landfill, let's put those food scraps to good use by composting them!"

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because they remind me so much of how I used to be. Not that long ago, I looked at couples with the same kind of envy and resentment – like why did they have something I wanted so badly? And when this person talks about their loneliness, I remember how, not even 10 years ago, I felt exactly the same way. Even when I'd had a really enjoyable time with a friend, as soon as they left, I'd feel lonely again. I know this person reminds me of many years in my



life that were super painful ... and I know I don't want to feel that again. I resented this person for reminding me of me.

And even though I know that, it can be hard for me to do what Chodron refers to as "drop[ping] the story line that goes along with the pain." The story line is the story we attach to a familiar feeling. In this example, when I feel loneliness and envy, the story line that used to come with that feeling is something like "no one wants to be around me," which as recently as a decade ago, often then morphed into the story line "why would they want to be around me, since I don't have much to offer?" Think about a painful feeling you're familiar with. What story is connected to that? You'll know it's probably true if it's a story that leaves you feeling critical toward yourself or someone else!

So ... the morning after my interaction with this friend, I'm in our meditation time. And I do the first step of tonglen: I imagine a place I've been that exudes spaciousness and openness. I breathe in that scene, which frees me to feel like I have that much spaciousness and openness inside me. Then I remember what all that loneliness and envy I used to feel feels like. Into that spacious place, I breathe all the suffering I went through when I felt that. And, into that spacious place, I also breathe in the suffering of the friend for whom I'd felt so little empathy the evening before. Then I breathed out relief from suffering, toward myself when I still feel this way, and toward my friend and all creatures whose joy is crushed by loneliness and envy. I tried to practice that tonglen cycle of breathe in pain, breathe out relief from suffering for the entire 15 minutes of our meditation time. I emphasize the word tried, since my mind often wandered to other places during those 15 minutes! At the end of this time, I did find myself feeling kinder toward my friend, kinder toward myself for the anguish I used to feel, and gratitude for all the people whose love has helped bring me to a much more joyful place in my life.

It's counter-intuitive to choose to breathe in suffering. And yet I have found that it can be a game-changer. To imagine a spacious place inside ourselves, to breathe into that space our suffering and the suffering of others – especially someone we have deeply mixed feelings about, or don't like at all – and then to breathe out relief from suffering: this sends compassion, kindness, and courage into a world that desperately needs it.

I'm grateful to those followers of Buddha who came up with such a risky, beautiful way to make love real.

Synod Assembly Set for May 31-June 1

The Southern Ohio Synod will hold its annual Synod Assembly on <u>Friday and Saturday, May 31-June 1</u> at Peace Lutheran Church in Dayton. Redeemer's delegates are **Scott Steiner** and **Wendy Stoica. Pastor Dave** also attends. This year the theme is "Out of the Waters ... Follow Me."

Gaza and Palestine Update

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

- The International Criminal Court [ICC] has issued arrest warrants for three leaders of Hamas for the attacks on October 7 and other crimes.
- The ICC has also issued arrest warrants for **Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu** and the Israeli Defense Minister for crimes including blocking food and other humanitarian assistance and other issues on the manner it has conducted the war against Hamas.
- President Biden has stated that the arrest warrants for the Israeli officials are outrageous.
- Spain, Norway and Ireland are recognizing Palestine as a state.
- The southern crossings remain closed by Israel which prohibits aid trucks from going into southern Gaza.
- Aid is not and has not exceeded the daily humanitarian aid that entered Gaza prior to the Israeli bombardment of Gaza.
- Virtually everyone in Gaza is now dependent on humanitarian aid for food and water.
- While President Biden continues to pause the shipment of 2,000-pound bombs to Israel, this week the administration advanced \$1 billion of military aid to Israel.
- The death toll has exceeded 35,000 with up to 70 percent of those killed being women and children.

Please pray for peace and advocate for a ceasefire in Gaza.
