Generous

The root of the word generous means "to give birth." It's the same root of words like generate, gender, and generic. Regardless of where the root comes from, generous is at the root of who Redeemer is.

Anyone stepping into the Narthex would know this. The challenge was issued last month: Fans, Fans, and More Fans! Knowing meteorologists are predicting a hot summer, and knowing people on limited incomes are having to limit their purchases only to what is most essential, we were summoned to collect more box fans to distribute at the <u>June 20</u> food giveaway than the remarkable bounty we blessed folks with last year. Even though we have a couple weeks to go, we have already met that challenge! Your deep desire to bring relief and joy to neighbors facing profound financial stressors once again has been transformed into something tangible and life-changing.

But no one should be surprised. Aside from giving your sweat equity to the food giveaway month after month, each month you choose to add a little something to the food we load into people's cars – personal care products, school supplies, whatever symbols of kindness we can give people who aren't used to being surprised by such acts of grace. (For June, this includes summer personal care items such as sunscreen and kid's sunscreen, body lotion, insect repellant, etc.)

And your generosity extends far beyond the boundaries of our neighborhood. In 2022, your generosity birthed contributions to Lutheran World Relief of over \$11,000. You made your love real to Ukrainians whose lives were being shattered by **Vladimir Putin's** immoral and illegal war against them.

Such generosity wouldn't be surprising if it flowed from a congregation of 200-300 people in worship. But we're nowhere close to that. And yet, look how we show up, look how we give, look how we love. Such a huge spirit of compassion abides in this place.

I thought about that this past Saturday. **Brad Phillips, Wendy Stoica**, and I spent the day in Beavercreek, Ohio, at the 2024 Synod Assembly gathering. At one point, **Bishop Susan Darcy Dillahunt** thanked the 183 churches in the Southern Ohio Synod for their financial support for the work of the synod. Throughout the day, we heard presentations from various groups expressing gratitude for the variety of ministries these contributions supported. I looked over the chart of how much each congregation had given last year. Between our regular mission support and our contributions to the Thrive! campaign, Redeemer gave \$33,342 to the synod in 2023. Of the 183 congregations in this synod, only 14 gave more to the synod than did Redeemer. I can't know what other financial commitments many of these other congregations have. Yet I was floored to see where Redeemer's level of support put us, since we're clearly not anywhere close to the 15th largest congregation in the synod. Then again, maybe I shouldn't have been surprised. Because generous is core to who you are.

<u>Saturday</u>, <u>June 15</u> is the Columbus Pride Parade. Area ELCA congregations hope to have at least 100 folks marching and riding behind the ELCA banner. Here's how to register:

To add your name to the list of people who will be marching or riding in this year's parade, click on the following link, fill in the information that is requested in the google doc and submit the response: https://forms.gle/v6TcfBBJjhto3YQd9.

To order a t-shirt, click on the following link to be taken to a page with multiple sizes and colors to choose from. Once you have chosen a size and color, place the order for a t-shirt that will be delivered directly to you. https://epiphanypickerington.secondslide.io/products/PRIDE/pride.

The group will meet at Trinity Lutheran Church (404 S. Third St.) between 8 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. This is where to check in and receive your wristband for the parade. No one will be permitted to march or ride without a wristband. The group will leave the parking lot together at 8:45 a.m.

For those who arrive at the church after the group leaves, text **Pastor Brad** at 248-470-3185 for information about where to meet the group. Folks are encouraged to bring a water bottle and any snacks and posters they'd like.

For those with mobility challenges and who need a ride from the parking lot to the parade route, plan to arrive at Trinity by 8 a.m. so the van can drive you to the staging area.

Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long- term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Recently, members of one of WCK's relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthausen** writes, "Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. Being Good Stewards of Earth #4: Ways to Compost Food Scraps

Michele Disbro asks, "Do you recycle right?

"Did you know that the Franklin County Landfill receives 1 million pounds of food EVERY day! That food can actually be composted and returned to the ground as nutrients. Some people compost food in their yards. Redeemer member, **Sue Yehling**, takes all of the inedible food scraps from the monthly food giveaways and the Saturday garden giveaways. She hauls the scraps to a compost pile on her property. Many of us do not have the space to set up a food compost in our yard and these food composting spots can often attract animals. (Sue has fun stories about watching animals drag away cracked open melons and squash, etc.) So how can we compost food at home?

"Buy a five-gallon bucket with a lid (available at hardware stores). Deposit any food scraps (including meat and bones if you're NOT composting in your own yard) into this bucket and store out of the way. You may want to keep it in your garage and empty it more often in the summer months because it will smell when you open the lid. You can buy green compostable bucket bags to line the bucket to make it easier to empty or be prepared to rinse out the bucket at times. Then simply take your bucket to one of the many free drop off sites as listed below. Rather than fill a landfill, let's put those food scraps to good use by composting them!"
