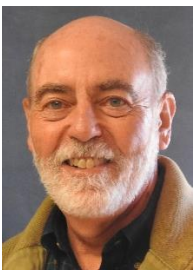

Binau to Serve as Supply Pastor during Sabbatical



Redeemer member and former Trinity Seminary faculty member **Pastor Brad Binau** will serve as the church's supply pastor while **Pastor Dave** is on sabbatical from July 29 to November 4.

The Congregation Council recently approved this recommendation from the Sabbatical Team. His contract will be for 25 hours a week for the entire three-month sabbatical period.

Pastor Brad served at La Jolla Lutheran Church in La Jolla, CA before being called to the seminary where he taught for 29 years, retiring in 2022. He has in recent years led several of Redeemer's Adult Ed classes on Sunday mornings, most recently discussing the poetry of Robert Frost. He is currently vice president of the church council.

The council notes that Redeemer first decided to provide pastoral sabbaticals in 2004 and as such, yearly sets aside funds for this purpose.

The Sabbatical Team, which will oversee the ministry here at Redeemer while **Pastor Dave** is gone and provide support to **Pastor Brad** includes **Michele Disbro, Kelley Frank, Kathy Mimplitch, Pastor Dave, Krista Skipper, Wendy Stoica and Trina Thornton.**

Plaque Honoring Larry Jones Dedicated

A plaque honoring **Coach Larry Jones** for his dedicated leadership of Redeemer's Summer Basketball Camp was dedicated **Thursday, June 6** - the start of this year's camp. Jones has led the camp since it was begun.

The plaque is mounted on the church building at the north end, near the basketball hoops. He is shown here with **Pastor Brad** who led the dedication.

Jones played pro ball for the Denver Rockets where he became the first the first player in the American Basketball Association (ABA) league to score 5,000 points. He also played for the Philadelphia 76ers, among others. He went on to coach for a number of teams including the Detroit Pistons.

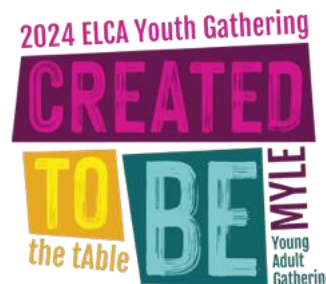

Saturday, June 15 is the Columbus Pride Parade. Area ELCA congregations hope to have at least 100 folks marching and riding behind the ELCA banner. Here's how to register:

To add your name to the list of people who will be marching or riding in this year's parade, click on the following link, fill in the information that is requested in the google doc and submit the response: <https://forms.gle/v6TcfBBJhto3YQd9> .

The group will meet at Trinity Lutheran Church (404 S. Third St.) between 8 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. This is where to check in and receive your wristband for the parade. No one will be permitted to march or ride without a wristband. The group will leave the parking lot together at 8:45 a.m.

For those with mobility challenges and who need a ride from the parking lot to the parade route, plan to arrive at Trinity by 8 a.m. so the van can drive you to the staging area.

The next giveaway is set for **Thursday, June 20**.

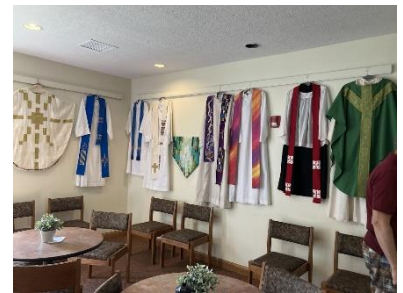
Tuesday Bible Study on Hiatus

Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer’s “Noisy Offering” will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long- term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Recently, members of one of WCK’s relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthausen** writes, “Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. Being Good Stewards of Earth #4: Ways to Compost Food Scraps

Michele Disbro asks, “Do you recycle right? Did you know that the Franklin County Landfill receives 1 million pounds of food EVERY day! That food can actually be composted and returned to the ground as nutrients. Some people compost food in their yards. Redeemer member, **Sue Yehling**, takes all of the inedible food scraps from the monthly food giveaways and the Saturday garden giveaways. She hauls the scraps to a compost pile on her property. Many of us do not have the space to set up a food compost in our yard and these food composting spots can often attract animals. (Sue has fun stories about watching animals drag away cracked open melons and squash, etc.) So how can we compost food at home?

“Buy a five-gallon bucket with a lid (available at hardware stores). Deposit any food scraps (including meat and bones if you’re NOT composting in your own yard) into this bucket and store out of the way. You may want to

keep it in your garage and empty it more often in the summer months because it will smell when you open the lid. You can buy green compostable bucket bags to line the bucket to make it easier to empty or be prepared to rinse out the bucket at times. Then simply take your bucket to one of the many free drop off sites as listed below. Rather than fill a landfill, let's put those food scraps to good use by composting them!"

The Wider Church Gaza and Palestine Update

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

- Four hostages were found alive by the Israel military and reunited with their loved ones. We rejoice in their return.
- A ceasefire seems both close, and frustratingly far from happening.
- The humanitarian pier built by the U.S. military is back in service.
- The Rafah crossing remains completely closed despite being totally controlled by the Israeli military.
- Nowhere near the 600 trucks of humanitarian aid that is needed every single day is getting in to Gaza.
- Thousands of far-right Israeli Jews took part in the parade through the Palestinian portions of Jerusalem.
- Israel bombed a school run by UNWRA, killing 45 people – mostly children and women.

Please pray for peace and advocate for a ceasefire in Gaza.
