Sabbatical Series Part One: *What Is a Sabbatical?*

A sabbatical is one of those things you hear about in different settings, but you might wonder what it is and how it came about.

According to Wikipedia, sabbatical is a rest or break from work, “an extended period of time intentionally spent on something that’s not your routine.”

Sabbatical leave is not a time to do similar professional work in another setting nor is it an extended vacation. The idea of sabbatical has biblical origins. The very root of the word (from the Hebrew: שָׁבַת Šabat) is the same as that of “Sabbath,” i.e. “to rest” or “to cease.” It is a time to be refreshed in body, mind, and spirit and to deepen one’s relationship with God.

This description written by the Tennessee Baptist Convention further explains its significance in Scripture:

“The concept of sabbatical is deeply and indisputably rooted in Scripture. The term is derived from the Old Testament idea of ‘Sabbath.’ The Hebrew word means ‘rest.’ God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh (Genesis 2:1-3). During the Hebrew children’s exodus from Egypt, God directed them (Exodus 16:26) to gather the manna daily but to rest on the seventh day (Sabbath). In numerous Old Testament passages, God admonished his people to work six days but to devote the seventh day to God as a day of rest (Exodus 20:9-10, 23:12, 31:15, 34:21, 35:2; Leviticus 23:3 and Deuteronomy 5:13). Among the Israelites, God instituted the Sabbath year (Leviticus 25:1-5). On every seventh year, the children of Israel were to refrain from farming the land and let the earth rest. Both the Israelites and the land benefited from the Sabbath rest.

“These passages suggest that there is a rhythm to life. As the preacher said, for everything there is a season (Ecclesiastes 3:1). Jesus’ own life and ministry reflect a deep understanding and appreciation for the rhythms of life. The demands upon Him were so great that his own ministry was punctuated with times of withdrawal for prayer and spiritual solitude (Matthew 14:23; Mark 6:46; Luke 5:16, 6:12).”

To help instructors renew their passion for their academic specialties, medieval colleges and universities began to grant professors a leave of absence every seven years. Most colleges and universities continue this practice today – giving teachers the opportunity to rest, expand their knowledge, write, travel to places relevant to their area of study and to teach at other institutions.

A letter was recently sent to Redeemer members and friends about **Pastor Dave’s** upcoming sabbatical. If you haven’t had a chance to read and reflect on this letter, the RLC Sabbatical Team encourages you to do so. We’ll explore more about sabbaticals in *Reflections* over the next few weeks. Please ask questions and be curious. This is an opportunity of rest and renewal for all of us!

Volunteers Needed for Next Food Giveaway Set for Thursday, June 20



Especially, given the heat predictions for the week and Thursday in particular, additional volunteers are needed for the next Lutheran Social Services (LSS)/Mid-Ohio Food Collective/Redeemer Food Giveaway this **Thursday, June 20**. This will allow for giving the regular volunteers a break in the activities. Plus, this is the week the fans will be distributed which will necessitate moving them to the parking lot. Set up begins at 1 p.m., with giveaway beginning at 3 p.m. Folks are needed to help throughout the entire afternoon.

Julie Johnson, who spearheaded this effort on behalf of Sister Act, reported Sunday that 175 fans have been collected, exceeding the goal of 170 fans. What better day should they be distributed than what is expected to be the hottest day so far in 2024!

Julie notes that the “really fun part is giving the fans to people who are only expecting food, and who need the relief fans can bring.

“Thank you, thank you, thank you for supporting this effort. The week of the giveaway temperatures are forecast to be in the 90s, so the fans will be especially needed.”

In addition, the “extra” items that Redeemer looks to distribute this week are summer personal care items such as sunscreen, kid's sunscreen, body lotion, insect repellent, etc. The items can be placed in the coatroom, just off the Narthex.

RLC Basketball Camp Underway; Donations of 8 Oz. Bottles of Water Needed

Redeemer's summer basketball camps for youth ages 8 to 14, led by former NBA and ABA player **Coach Larry Jones**, is now underway and members are asked to donate **8 oz.** bottles of water for use by participants – especially given the heat warnings out for this week.. A total of 39 youth are registered. Redeemer provides these camps for free. They run for six weeks, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday. They conclude on **Thursday, July 18**.

Redeemer Summer Book Study Begins Wednesday, June 19

The group is starting in June because **Pastor Dave** will be at the ELCA National Youth Gathering in the middle of July. They will meet both in-person and on Zoom. Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long-term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Recently, members of one of WCK's relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthansen** writes, "Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. Being Good Stewards of Earth #5: A Reminder of 3Rs

Michele Disbro writes, "As a final wrap up to how you can be a good steward of the earth, I want to remind you of the 3R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle.

1. "**Reduce** – This is the first and best thing to do. Reduce the amount of waste you produce. For example, reduce the smaller-sized items of things you use and choose to buy the larger refill sizes. Reduce the items you buy that are available in non-recyclable containers. Reduce your food waste by meal planning. Consider using cloth napkins. There are many ways to reduce your waste so take that first small step.

2. "**Reuse** - Instead of buying water in plastic bottles, bring your own refillable water bottle. Consider packing your lunch in washable containers. Rather than simply throwing out something that is broken, see if it can be fixed. If you don't want certain items anymore, donate them so someone else can use them. Be creative and find new uses for something that you don't use anymore.

3. “**Recycle** – There are many places to recycle paper, cardboard, and plastic so give it a try! Remember: you can always check out the SWACO website with any questions you have at <https://recycleright.org/recycle-reuse-search-tool/>.”

22 Ask God to grant hope, stamina and healing to those recovering from the devastation left by tornadoes and severe storms across our country. Give thanks for our work together through Lutheran Disaster Response to provide relief and assistance to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and worldwide.

23 “Waking up, [Jesus] rebuked the wind and said to the sea, ‘Be silent! Be still!’ Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. He said to [the disciples], ‘Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?’ And they were filled with great fear” (Mark 4:39-41). Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our trust in God in the face of every challenge and situation that tests our faith.

24 Pray for youth, adults and congregations preparing for the ELCA Youth Gathering, the tAble (for young people with disabilities), the Multicultural Youth Leadership Event (MYLE) and the Young Adult Gathering. The Community Beyond Gaza and Palestine Update

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

- **Benny Gantz** has left the war cabinet in Israel, citing disagreements with **Benjamin Netanyahu** over Gaza – including plans for after the war. This complicates the peace process as Netanyahu will likely turn to far right leaders to shore up his government.
- Hamas has responded positively to the peace proposal. While there remain differences to work out both sides appear ready to negotiate.
- The Rafah crossing continues to be closed to humanitarian aid and hundreds of trucks are backed up in Egypt.
- A major problem continues to exist with the aid that is getting into Israel. There is a lack of trucks and truckers willing to deliver aid throughout the Gaza strip. So much needed aid sits in warehouses.
- The raid that freed four Israeli hostages killed over 250 Palestinians. An interview on PBS with Doctors Without Borders reported that 190 people were brought to that hospital alone – including numerous people who were pronounced dead on arrival. Burns, serious fractures, severed limbs and other serious injuries were common.
- Hospitals have little fuel, compounding their difficulty serving their patients.
- Palestinians in the West Bank continue to face violence from illegal Israeli settlements.
- Aid convoys from Jordan continue to be harassed by Jews as they make their way to Gaza.

Pray for peace – a just peace for all.

CAIR-Ohio Announces Turaani as New Executive Director

The Ohio chapter of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR-OH) announced recently that **Khalid Turaani** has been named its new executive director, overseeing operations in Columbus, Cincinnati and Dayton.

Turaani has more than 15 years of executive experience in public affairs and advocacy in Washington, D.C., and Europe. His tenure includes engagements with Congress and the European Parliament, along with a decade-long tenure as a CEO in the private sector.

Beyond his professional roles, Khalid has been a community leader in the areas of voters' rights and coalition-building around electoral politics and human rights, CAIR-OH said. Born and raised in a refugee camp, he has been involved in humanitarian missions that have spanned addressing the Flint water crisis to aiding refugees in Gaza, Thailand, Iraq, Syria and Lebanon.

"We are thrilled to welcome Mr. Turaani into our community. His wealth of experience and proven leadership resonate deeply with CAIR's mission," said **Nabeel Raazi**, president of the board of directors of CAIR-OH. "In these challenging times, extraordinary effort and leadership are imperative. We are delighted that our rigorous search process has led us to Khalid Turaani, an esteemed American Muslim leader of national recognition."

CAIR is America's largest Muslim civil liberties and advocacy organization. CAIR-Ohio has three offices in Ohio – Cincinnati, Columbus, and Cleveland. Its stated mission is to enhance the understanding of Islam, protect civil rights, promote justice, and empower American Muslims.
