- **Hiring Pastor Brad Binau** to provide pastoral supply coverage during the sabbatical period. An agreement with Pastor Binau has recently been approved by the Congregation Council. Under Pastor Brad's pastoral leadership, the congregation can look forward to guest preachers once a month (August, September, October), a discussion series on grief and loss in conjunction with a preview of Redeemer's Memorial Garden, a Blessing of the Animals celebration, opportunity for study of the book of Revelation, a Reformation dialog, the theology of baseball, and more!

- **Rest and renewal opportunities** for the congregation as a whole. New and not so new fellowship opportunities are in the works. Ideas have included a trivia night, outings to Central Ohio locations like the Columbus Museum of Art or the Dawes Arboretum's Big Bugs exhibit, gathering for meals at specialty restaurants in the area or having a picnic, going to a Columbus Clippers game, and taking "Holy Hikes" at various Columbus MetroParks locations. - Celebratory blessings to begin and end the sabbatical period. There will be a special blessing for Pastor Dave at the end of the worship service on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>July 28</u> as he leaves for his sabbatical, as well as a blessing upon his return.

- Ongoing communication about sabbatical happenings. In addition to printed communication, information will be shared during announcements after worship and through other in-person opportunities. After worship on <u>Sunday, July 21</u>, Sabbatical Team members will be available for small group and one-on-on conversations at the Narthex tables. Bring your questions and curiosity!

During the sabbatical, usual office, ministry, and organizational activities and routines will continue. Staff (including Pastor Brad) will continue to manage dayto-day operations. Ministry leaders and teams will continue beloved and seasonal activities and events.

1. Deliver three carloads of goods to the Whitehall Goodwill Store,

2. Donate many pairs of "walking shoes" to **Dottie Odrosky** who participates in an organization called "Sole Care" It provides foot care (washing, massage) for unhoused men and women from the Open Shelter and then provides a pair of shoes. The center was particularly thankful for the men's clothes as the shelves were nearly empty in that category; meaning that clothing was to go on the shelves immediately. (Outside, the line was already long with people waiting for assistance.)

If any lunches are left after the clean-up of breakfast, they are shared with the Friends of the Homeless shelter across the street or with those who stop at the church in need of food. # Volunteers Step Up for Food Giveaway, Serve 214 Households, Distribute Total of 175 Fans



Kathy Zwanziger reports, "A HUGE thank you to all who assisted with the Lutheran Social Services-Mid-Ohio Food Collective food giveaway on an extremely hot day in June! As Pastor Dave noted in our opening prayer time, there were many (~12) more volunteers than



we had ever had! That included some relatives of members, as well as a couple people who came for the food and offered to help.



"As for the numbers: 95 degrees and plenty of humidity! We received eight pallets of food for a total of 9,572 pounds – and nearly all of it was distributed to the 214 guests. They represented 714 people, 214 of them children. Another 150 were seniors.

"We had 83 new families, up 31 compared to May. Obviously, all of the 175 fans YOU provided were given to people to help provide some relief during this heat wave.

"Because of the heat, we made some adjustments to our routine. It was helpful to have the extra volunteers making it possible for everyone to take breaks by entering the Narthex to cool down – a rule that was enforced. We adjusted our registration process to limit the time the 'registrars' had to stand on the hot blacktop and to speed up the line. That meant some people entered the names into the LSS database, one of them far into the evening (thanks, Sue!). Other registrars entered the information when they came into the church for their cooling break – and allowed me to stay in the building and enter names for the entire time.

"What a wonderful blessing you were able to provide our neighbors! Thank you all!"

# **Clearness Committee Holds First Meeting**

**Rich Pautsch** writes, "Our first clearness committee met on Tuesday, June 19, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at church. We met to discuss my question, 'What is my wealth for?' I had previously distributed a summary of my relationship to wealth to the group. I invited the group to ask me open-ended questions to help me explore.

"Without giving advice or trying to 'fix' me, the group asked me questions. I was asked questions I did not expect. The group gently led me to realize that what I was asking was not my real question. I was really asking, 'What is my life for?'

"Right now, I am not sure how I answer this question. I feel now though that I am asking a better question. For me, asking the right question is a big step toward finding what I seek.

"If this kind of deeper, personal conversation is something you would like to spend time with, let me or **Pastor Dave** know. Is there something you wonder about that you would like to discuss?"

## RLC Basketball Camp Underway; Donations of 8 Oz. Bottles of Water Needed

Redeemer's summer basketball camps for youth ages 8 to 14, led by former NBA and ABA player **Coach Larry Jones**, is now underway and members are asked to donate **8** oz. bottles of water for use by participants – especially given the heat warnings out for this week. They can be placed in the coatroom, just off the Narthex.

A total of 58 youth are registered. Redeemer provides these camps for free. They run for six weeks, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday. They conclude on **Thursday, July 18**.

## **Redeemer Summer Book Study Underway**

In recent summer book studies, Redeemer's Book Group has focused on immigration, racism, and death and dying. This summer, they will discuss a book that begins with the statement: "The United States, the richest country on earth, has more poverty than any other advanced democracy. Why?"

Pulitzer-prize author Matthew Desmond dives into that question in his book *Poverty, By America*. He looks at causes, and, most importantly, presents his own solution for how actually to end poverty.

The group meets Wednesday evenings from 7-8:30 p.m. on **July 3**, and **July 10**. The group started early because **Pastor Dave** will be at the ELCA National Youth Gathering in the middle of July. They are meeting both in-person and on Zoom. The second discussion on June 26 will cover chapters 3 through 5. Contact the church office to receive the discussion questions before the meeting. # Noisy Offering to Support World Central Kitchen

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to the World Central Kitchen (WCK) which is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. Food is essential to life every single day, all over the world -- and it is more important than ever in a crisis.

Not only is a thoughtful, freshly prepared meal one less thing someone has to worry about in the wake of a disaster, it is a reminder that they are not alone, someone is thinking about them, and someone cares.

Food has the power to be the nourishment and hope we need to pick ourselves back up in the darkest times. This is the foundation of **Chef Jose Andres**, founder of World Central Kitchen. The program began after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. For seven years they worked on resilience programs investing in long- term solutions around the food needs in the Caribbean and Central America.

Then in 2017 with Hurricane Harvey hitting Houston, WCK began to move into action and respond to areas hit by natural disasters. So 2017 they went to Houston.

Recently, members of one of WCK's relief teams were killed while going into Gaza to deliver food. **Kay Ernsthausen** writes, "Since the bombing in Gaza there has been an earthquake in Taiwan. There are so many places that need food. We do what we can for our neighbors with the food giveaways and the garden and this is an opportunity to feed those who are hungry around the world. # Being Good Stewards of Earth #5: A Reminder of 3Rs

**Michele Disbro** writes, "As a final wrap up to how you can be a good steward of the earth, I want to remind you of the 3R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle.

1. "**Reduce** – This is the first and best thing to do. Reduce the amount of waste you produce. For example, reduce the smaller-sized items of things you use and choose to buy the larger refill sizes. Reduce the items you buy that are available in non-recyclable containers. Reduce your food waste by meal planning. Consider using cloth napkins. There are many ways to reduce your waste so take that first small step.

2. "**Reuse** - Instead of buying water in plastic bottles, bring your own refillable water bottle. Consider packing your lunch in washable containers. Rather than simply throwing out something that is broken, see if it can be fixed. If you don't want certain items anymore, donate them so someone else can use them. Be creative and find new uses for something that you don't use anymore.

3. "**Recycle** – There are many places to recycle paper, cardboard, and plastic so give it a try! Remember: you can always check out the SWACO website with any questions you have at <u>https://recycleright.org/recycle-reuse-search-tool/</u>."

## Quotes from June 30th message, Better Angels

From Jon Meacham, *The Soul of America: The Battle for Our Better Angels*, Random House, 2018:

In 1961, Eleanor Roosevelt said, "The course of history is directed by the choices we make and our choices grow out of the ideas, the beliefs, the values, the dreams of the people. It is not so much the powerful leaders that determine our destiny as the much more powerful influence of the combined voice of the people themselves.... Surely, in the light of history, it is more intelligent to hope rather than to fear, to try rather than not to try" (p. 14).

The message of Martin Luther King, Jr. – that we should be judged on the content of our character, not on the color of our skin – dwells in the American soul. So does the menace of the Ku Klux Klan. History hangs precariously in the balance between such extremes. Our fate [depends on whether] hope or...fear...triumph[s] (p. 7).

History shows us that we are frequently vulnerable to fear, bitterness, and strife. The good news is that we have come through such darkness before.... Periods of public dispiritedness are not new and...they are survivable. In the best of moments, witness, protest, and resistance can intersect with the leadership of an American president to lift us to higher ground. In darker times, if a particular president fails to advance the national story – or worse, moves us backward – then those who witness, protest, and resist must stand fast, in hope, working toward a better day (p. 5).

Fear feeds anxiety and produces anger; hope...breeds optimism and feelings of well-being. Fear is about limits; hope is about growth. Fear casts its eyes [anxiously] across the landscape [looking for all kinds of threats]; hope looks forward, toward the horizon. Fear points at others, assigning blame; hope points ahead, working for a common good. Fear pushes away; hope pulls others closer. Fear divides; hope unifies. (p. 16) In our finest hours...the soul of the country [leads us] ... to open our arms rather than to clench our fists; to look out rather than to turn inward; to accept rather than to reject (p. 8)

Give thanks for the companionship, support, encouragement and wisdom we receive from our faith communities and siblings in Christ, which strengthen our ability to share the good news, care for our neighbors in need and inspire hope and peace in the world — together.

**8** Pray that the Spirit will stir enthusiasm, creativity and wisdom in the leaders, volunteers and staff of the churchwide organization as they serve youth and adults from congregations across the country during the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans.

# The Community Beyond Gaza and Palestine Update

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

- The death toll in Gaza has now topped 38,000 Palestinians, with untold numbers buried in the rubble. Over 500 have died in the occupied West Bank – the other portion of Israel that is meant to be Palestinian land.

- This past weekend at least 100 Gazans died in an Israeli attack on Gaza City in the north, and at least 25 were killed in bombing in the humanitarian area in the south that Israelis had designated for people of Rafah to flee to.

- NPR and the Associated Press this week ran a story detailing how some extended families have been nearly completely decimated by the war in Gaza – including one family that had 173 family members killed in December 2023. The death toll for that family alone now tops 270. There are hundreds of Palestinian families who have experienced over 25 deaths. To a degree never seen before, Israel is killing entire families. Grandparents, parents,



children, uncles, aunts, cousins and more had often settled in the same areas to maintain close family ties. Even when evacuations from one area of Gaza would take place they would gather in new locations. Entire families are buried in mass graves, in hospital courtyards or beneath staircases in the homes where they were killed.

- Tensions have increased in northern Israel with bombing to and from Lebanon based Hezbollah.

- The Israeli defense minister is flying to Washington for talks this week.

- U.S. House Speaker Mike Johnson has invited Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to speak to Congress and he has accepted.

- Over 120,000 Israelis protested in Tel Aviv on Friday, June 22 against Prime Minister Netanyahu and member of his far right coalition.

- Humanitarian aid remains much lower than the needed amount, and aid that gets into Gaza often does not get delivered to those in need.

Pray for peace – a just peace for all.
