Council Meeting Highlights for September/October

RLC's "Remembrance Garden" has been one of the Congregation Council's major topics recently. Funding for the "hardscape" costs were approved and work is currently in progress. Dedication for the site was on All Saints Day. The Memorial Garden team will be working on the next steps including developing procedures and policies as well as a maintenance plan. (See separate article, this issue of *Reflections*.)

As one might expect, the 2025 Budget has taken up its share of Council's meetings! The congregation will receive it for approval at the annual meeting in January. Opportunities to review the budget and ask questions prior to the annual meeting will be given during the Sunday School hour in December. Dates to come soon.

President Krista Skipper reported that the Executive Team is working on nominations to the 2025-26 Council slate. The congregation will be asked to approve the full slate at its Congregational Meeting on **Nov. 24**.

The Executive Team moved to appoint **Kay Ernsthansen** as treasurer starting **Jan. 1, 2025**, replacing **Julie Johnson** whose term will end **Jan. 31, 2025**. The motion was seconded and passed by Council.

Commitments to Reconciling in Christ are currently being updated so that Redeemer's profile is up to date. Council voted and approved that for any future pastoral vacancy, council would appoint a call committee that is in agreement with item #2 of the RIC commitments: "Be open to calling an LGBTQIA+ and Black, Brown, Indigenous, Person of Color (BIPOC) Rostered Leader. " Additionally, the budget will reflect an annual financial contribution to support the national RIC program.

Remembering Garden Going Forward

"The dedication of the first phase of the Remembering Garden was a truly meaningful conclusion to Sunday's service. The idea for such a space had first been introduced and supported at a congregational meeting many years ago and had been percolating ever since. Now that there's a physical presence, and not just a vague concept, it's time to involve more folks in the continuing process of developing and then maintaining our garden," writes **Mary Benis**. "Numerous areas will need to be planned and overseen:

- "**Design**—The next step will be to consider the landscape design the contractor provides and then tailor it to our preferences.

- "**Landscape care**—The landscape decisions will probably include some elements that will need to be monitored—maybe pruned, sprayed, cut back annually, etc.

- "**Hardscape**—The paved area will need to be monitored, maybe cleaned off, and the water pump turned on and off seasonally.

- "**Memorial Book**—The book of tribute pages for those whose remains have been scattered or buried in the main garden area will need to be designed, selected, and maintained.

- "**Statuary**—Perhaps there should be a cross of some sort in the main scattering area and maybe an appropriate statue of some sort in the smaller area reserved for our pets. These would need to be selected and acquired.

- "**Signage**—There should be some visible indication of the garden's identity and purpose—maybe a plaque or two of some sort? Again, these would need to be selected and acquired.

- "**Policies**—Every new space or activity needs thoughtful policies and procedures to guide it. These need to be considered and implemented sooner rather than later.

- "**Financial support**—The plan has been to encourage members and friends of Redeemer to "sponsor" parts of the landscape design. Those opportunities would need to be determined and then communicated to the congregation.

"Lots to think about for a seemingly small space but one imbued with lots of meaning!

"As with all other ministries at Redeemer, the most effective programs are those with broad support. So please consider how you'd like to participate. Involvement could be short- or long-term, area-specific or general -- you decide. And then let one of the current team members know – **Mary Benis, Brad Binau, Michele Disbro, Kathy Mimplitch, Dave Shull, or Linda Williams**. Questions, concerns, or suggestions are also always welcome."

Engel Provides Overview of Special Funds Team Purpose, Activities

Special Funds Team (SFT) Chair Dave Engel writes that the team, approved by the congregation in 2018, supervises the investment of each fund (Mission Endowment Fund, Memorial and Special Gifts Fund that includes the Memorial Fund, and the Mary Kohler Ministry Fund, and the RLC Building and Equipment Fund) as "entrusted to it by the congregation. These monies are currently invested in the Columbus Foundation. Interest earnings from the total investment are distributed proportionate to the amount in the individual funds.

"The **Mission Endowment Fund** provides for mission work beyond the operating budget of RLC. A percentage (4 percent) of the annual earnings are distributed annually" for the following purposes:

a. "Establish and support ministries of outreach within or on behalf of the congregation.

b. "Further partnerships in mission through the synodical, regional and national expressions of the ELCA.

c. "To support capital improvements, debt retirement a building program of RLC when circumstances warrant. Forms to suggest recipients of this year's distribution are forthcoming.

"Suggestions for unrestricted **Memorial Gift** funds are made to the SFT which will then make a recommendation to the Congregation Council.

“The **Mary Kohler Ministry Fund** is an unrestricted fund created by gifts from **Mary Kohler** and an anonymous donor. Applications for educational purposes and for new or existing RLC neighborhood ministries receive priority. The Congregation Council determines disbursements. A suggestion for distribution of money from the Mary Kohler Ministry Fund are made to the SFT which may recommend a distribution of funds to the Congregational Council. Actual distribution is at the direction of the Congregation Council.

“The **RLC Church Building and Equipment Fund** funds the capital expenditure needs that exceed the congregation’s annual budget. Additions to and distributions from this fund are controlled by the Congregation and the Congregation Council. The funds are distributed at the direction of the Congregation Council.”

In addition to Dave, members of the Special Funds Team are **Wendy Stoica**, treasurer; **Terry Warren**, secretary; **Ashley Bird**; and **Julie Boreman**.

‘Noisy Offering’ Going to Lutheran Disaster Response

the rotation of the earth,
the movement of the stars through the ages
all are in her stillness, in her gaze.
Her watching encompasses everything;
her listening goes out into all the world.

What did the noticing look like? I spent a lot of time sitting on our front screened-in porch reading, writing, talking with friends, watching people, dogs, cats, and the occasional deer go by. I took deep breaths. I did a fair amount of biking – again, trying to focus on looking at what was right around me, and not day-dreaming too much. I drove very little. I cooked a lot of new things. Mike and I had neighbors over for meals, as well as good friends. We had a lot more meals together than we usually do. I think our very social 13-year-old Australian Shepherd mix enjoyed having me around more than usual.

A high point was a **Rick Steves** tour to Portugal in September. Before the tour started, we spent four days in Lyon, France, with a college friend of mine who’s lived in France for decades. Mike hasn’t had a chance to travel very much, so he was totally thrilled. Two days into our time in Portugal, we were sitting in park in Lisbon. He said, “I just realized that this time in France and here has been the first time in my life I haven’t been aware of being Black. I’ve just been able to relax.” The tour guide was full of life and joy and knowledge, and somehow she was able to take a tour group of 28 strangers and turn us into a community of people who really cared about each other.

During the trip, a couple from Seattle was celebrating their 40th anniversary, and the day after was Mike’s and my second anniversary. When the tour guide found this out, she called the hotel where we’d be those two nights and arranged so the anniversary couples got the best rooms in the hotel. And when we got to our rooms, both couples found a bottle of champagne in an ice bucket waiting for us. I found Lisbon to be one of the most beautiful cities I’ve ever visited. An especially enjoyable dinner took place in the medieval town of Obidos. Mike and I got involved in a conversation involving our waiter, and a Portuguese man at a neighboring table who was eating with his mother.

We delighted in talking about all kinds of things. We thought the occasion merited a photo, so I've included that with this article.

Because Mike only gets two weeks of vacation a year, he didn't have any left after Portugal. I took two weeks in October and went to the west coast. I spent a week visiting friends from the 23 years I lived in Seattle, including four days hiking and eating in British Columbia. I saw 11 different friends during that time. Then I flew to Los Angeles, and saw my friend from first grade who lives in Palm Springs, a clergy friend from Seattle who's in San Diego, and my playmate from my year in India when I was 10 who's in Los Angeles. Again, such rich, joyful, love-filled conversations.



My last day of sabbatical, on All Saint's Day, I went back to Wooster, to worship at the church I grew up in, the church where my parents found so many friendships and whose members helped my parents so much during the last years of their lives. I walked around my elementary school, and peeked in the windows of my 2nd grade class (it hasn't changed very much!), and walked to the edge of the schoolyard hill that went down into our backyard. I remembered all the sledding that had happened there, including the time I'd stupidly agreed to let a first grader steer our toboggan down it. We ended up smashing into a tree, and I ended up with five stitches in the back of my head!

If you haven't guessed by now, sabbatical is about having a relationship with time that is totally different from when one is working. What's difference is on sabbatical you have so much freedom. There's no pressure to get things done in time or on time. Unbelievably, there's basically always enough time to do whatever it is you're up to. There's always enough time.

As I said in the opening of worship yesterday, on the Sundays I was in town the past three months, I got to visit different faith communities. While there were things I appreciated about them, I always left with the same feeling: there isn't a group of people I'd rather be worshiping with than you all.

As I talk to clergy who work at churches which don't offer a sabbatical, I realize how incredibly fortunate I am to be your pastor. Thank you for making noticing time possible. Thank you for this most amazing gift.

Palestine Update

The following update is provided by **Julianne Johnson**:

“Last week **Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu** fired his defense minister who has disagreed with him from time to time about the offensive in Gaza. While our attention has been on our own elections, Israel has continued its military offensive especially in Northern Gaza. Virtually all the buildings and all agriculture in Gaza have been damaged or destroyed and Israel has built a buffer zone on the entire eastern border of Gaza and a buffer zone between Gaza and Egypt, as well as a military corridor through Gaza between the north and the south.

“The implications of the election of **Donald Trump** for Palestinians in Gaza and the occupied West Bank are dire. During his first term as president, Trump gave Netanyahu everything he wanted - including building the U.S. embassy on disputed territory.”

Prayer Concerns from ELCA

November 12 Praise God for the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, who took upon himself the burden of our sins and human weaknesses so that we can know true freedom, be renewed for doing God’s work in the world and take comfort in the promise of eternal life with God.

Give thanks for the ministries of the NAES and the Evangelical Lutheran Education Association that equip, inspire and support Christian educators.

16 Ask God to help us welcome and treat immigrants, refugees and asylum-seekers with respect and compassion, accompanying them through the complex process of rebuilding their lives in our country.

17 Jesus warned that being his disciple is never easy or safe, but we are never alone or ill-equipped for doing God’s work in the world — we are accompanied by the Spirit and our siblings in Christ. Praise God!

18 Give thanks for those who work in hospice care and attend to the comfort and quality of life of people as they approach the end of life, and who provide emotional and spiritual support for their families.
