The November Sister Act meeting is <u>Wednesday, Nov. 20</u> at 6:30 p.m. here at Redeemer. This gathering is the group's planning session for 2025, so folks are asked to bring their ideas and calendars to plan for next year.

Non-Police Crisis Response System

Since 2019, the Columbus Safety Coalition and BREAD have advocated for a non-police crisis system to handle non-violent issues involving behavioral health, food/housing insecurity, and mediation.

They are currently undertaking a ballot initiative for the November 2025 election to create a non-police crisis response unit. There will be a town hall giving more information on <u>Monday, Nov. 18</u> at 7 p.m. at First Unitarian Universalist Church (93 W. Weisheimer Road, Columbus 43214) where they will explain the model that they propose, the city's contract to study the program, and the need for this ballot initiation.

Other Ohio cities such as Cincinnati and Dayton already have such programs.

Council Meeting Highlights for September/October

RLC's "Remembrance Garden" has been one of the Congregation Council's major topics recently. Funding for the "hardscape" costs were approved and work is currently in progress. Dedication for the site was on All Saints Day. The Memorial Garden team will be working on the next steps including developing procedures and policies as well as a maintenance plan. (See separate article, this issue of *Reflections*.)

As one might expect, the 2025 Budget has taken up its share of Council's meetings! The congregation will receive it for approval at the annual meeting in January. Opportunities to review the budget and ask questions prior to the annual meeting will be given during the Sunday School hour in December. Dates to come soon.

President Krista Skipper reported that the Executive Team is working on nominations to the 2025-26 Council slate. The congregation will be asked to approve the full slate at its Congregational Meeting on <u>Nov. 24</u>.

The Executive Team moved to appoint **Kay Ernsthausen** as treasurer starting <u>Jan. 1, 2025</u>, replacing Julie Johnson whose term will end <u>Jan. 31, 2025</u>. The motion was seconded and passed by Council.

Commitments to Reconciling in Christ are currently being updated so that Redeemer's profile is up to date. Council voted and approved that for any future pastoral vacancy, council would appoint a call committee that is in agreement with item #2 of the RIC commitments: "Be open to calling an LGBTQIA+ and Black, Brown, Indigenous, Person of Color (BIPOC) Rostered Leader. " Additionally, the budget will reflect an annual financial contribution to support the national RIC program.

Remembering Garden Going Forward

"The dedication of the first phase of the Remembering Garden was a truly meaningful conclusion to Sunday's service. The idea for such a space had first been introduced and supported at a congregational meeting many years ago and had been percolating ever since. Now that there's a physical presence, and not just a vague concept, it's time to involve more folks in the continuing process of developing and then maintaining our garden," writes **Mary Benis.** "Numerous areas will need to be planned and overseen:

- "**Design**—The next step will be to consider the landscape design the contractor provides and then tailor it to our preferences.

- "Landscape care—The landscape decisions will probably include some elements that will need to be monitored maybe pruned, sprayed, cut back annually, etc.

- "Hardscape—The paved area will need to be monitored, maybe cleaned off, and the water pump turned on and off seasonally.

Reflections

- "**Memorial Book**—The book of tribute pages for those whose cremains have been scattered or buried in the main garden area will need to be designed, selected, and maintained.

- "**Statuary**—Perhaps there should be a cross of some sort in the main scattering area and maybe an appropriate statue of some sort in the smaller area reserved for our pets. These would need to be selected and acquired.

- "Signage—There should be some visible indication of the garden's identity and purpose—maybe a plaque or two of some sort? Again, these would need to be selected and acquired.

- "**Policies**—Every new space or activity needs thoughtful policies and procedures to guide it. These need to be considered and implemented sooner rather than later.

- "**Financial support**—The plan has been to encourage members and friends of Redeemer to "sponsor" parts of the landscape design. Those opportunities would need to be determined and then communicated to the congregation.

"Lots to think about for a seemingly small space but one imbued with lots of meaning!

"As with all other ministries at Redeemer, the most effective programs are those with broad support. So please consider how you'd like to participate. Involvement could be short- or long-term, area-specific or general -- you decide. And then let one of the current team members know – Mary Benis, Brad Binau, Michele Disbro, Kathy Mimlitch, Dave Shull, or Linda Williams. Questions, concerns, or suggestions are also always welcome."

'Noisy Offering' Going to Lutheran Disaster Response

Palestine Update

The following update is provided by Julianne Johnson:

"I'd like to start a series of articles about the history of Palestine, because that history has had surprises for me as I've tried to learn more about the complexities of the conflicts. We hear if ancient Israel in the Bible and in church, but I want to speak of Israel from the time of World War I to the present. And this article will only cover the time before the modern-day state of Israel was founded. One other fact before World War I that needs to be noted is that in 1897 the World Zionist Organization voted to work to establish a Jewish state in the land of Palestine.

"World War I (1914-1918) was a war between the Allies (France, United Kingdom, United States, Russia, Italy and Japan) against the Central Powers (The German Empire, Austria-Hungary, the Ottoman Empire, and Bulgaria). The Ottoman Empire included the area of Palestine which was ruled by the Turks.

"The Allies were looking for additional support and engaged in secret negotiations with the Arabs, but also with the World Zionist Organization. The rebel Arabs wanted an independent and united Arab state from Aleppo to Aden which the British agreed to recognize. Secretly in 1916, the British government signed the Sykes-Picot Treaty with



France, with assent from Russia and Italy, over how the Ottoman Empire would be divided once it was defeated. The agreement gave the United Kingdom control over what is today southern Israel and Palestine, Jordan and southern Iraq, as well as a small area that included the ports of Haifa and Acre.

24 In a world of force, intimidation and superiority, pray that we will take to heart the leadership of Jesus Christ, whose power manifests in humility, love, mercy and justice.

25 Give thanks for the people and experiences that break into our daily routines, interjecting joy and laughter.
