# A New Exchange of the Peace

In my message yesterday, I talked about how you and I are the way God seeks to show up in the world. I said if we wish to walk in the way of Jesus, then perhaps we might look at the life he lived, the stories he told, and the prayers he prayed. These reveal his commitment to reducing the suffering he encountered around and within him. As we seek to be the way God shows up in the world in Advent and beyond, before reacting to any situation, we might stop for a moment, look at what we're about to say or do, and ask ourselves, "Will this reduce the suffering in my midst, or add to it?"

I read an article in my divinity school magazine yesterday that speaks to the issue of how the polarization in our country grows out of the suffering that results from not understanding each other's fears and values. As I read it, I thought of conversations I have had with some of you about the political and religious divisions among your families and friends. So I'm sharing excerpts from it in the hope these words might offer you a way to imagine healing some of these painful divides. Titled "A New Exchange of the Peace," it is written by Mark Beckwith, who served for 12 years as the Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, NJ. It was his work around gun violence prevention that led him to do what he describes in this article; the article comes from the Fall 2024 issue of another publication called *Reflections*, a Yale Divinity School publication.

Bishop Beckwith writes: "One arena of American life where people tend to fiercely grasp a railing, intensely resist conversations around reconciliation, and adamantly fight about legislation, is on the issue of guns in America. Simply put, the gun rights side insists that more guns make people safer; the gun violence prevention side seeks to demonstrate that more guns make people more vulnerable to violence. In conversations between the two, it is extremely difficult to find common ground.

"Several years ago, in searching for common ground, I went to a gun show. There was lots of talking between the vendors and shoppers, and with the representatives from the NRA Foundation and local gun clubs. And I listened. In truth, I eavesdropped – and hoped that people wouldn't recognize me as an outlier, which I certainly was. In very short order I realized that the language these people used so comfortably was language I didn't understand. But I could certainly see and hear the passion. The passion was real, and it was deep – and the gun show was a safe place where they could claim their identity, an identity that had a long history and that was uniquely American. On the surface, their identity was about guns, but it ran deeper than that; the vendors and shoppers were a part of an American culture that is not easily acknowledged and is often misunderstood. And it is a culture that is not going away. It has been here ever since Europeans came and settled on this continent, claiming it as their own, using guns to kill for food, protect livestock from predators – and more than occasionally to kill or subdue whoever blocked the path of manifest destiny.

# Mission Endowment Fund Seeks Suggestions for 2024 Distribution

Every year the Redeemer congregation donates a percentage (4 percent) of the year-end market value of the Mission Endowment Fund (MEF) to other charities on behalf of the congregation. The 2024 3rd quarter market value was \$165,285 which would provide approximately \$6,611 for distribution. (The final amount may increase or decrease depending on the 4th quarter value which will be available in January). The guidelines for distribution, as established in the constitution are as follows:

- To establish/support ministries of outreach on behalf of the congregation.
- To further partnerships in mission through the synod and other arms of the ELCA.

Some prior recipients have included the LSS Food Pantry, Lutheran Memorial Camp/HopeWood Pines, Mid-Ohio Food Co-operative, Lutheran Social Services, Ronald McDonald House, and Groveport Special Olympics.

To fulfill the Mission Endowment Fund's guidelines, the Special Funds Team (SFT) is seeking suggestions for the use of the funds for 2024. Please use the <u>pink</u> form found at the back of this **Reflections** or on the table in the rear of the Narthex to nominate possible recipients. Complete it and place it in the Sunday offering plate or leave it in the church office.

Suggestions are due by <u>Sunday</u>, <u>December 15</u>. The Special Funds Team will then make its recommendation and forward it to council for action by the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January.

# Opportunities for Worship, Breaking Bread, Conversations, Book Study with Neighbors at Christ United Methodist Church

**Pastor Dave** writes, "Since before I came to be with Redeemer in 2017, we have been doing a Good Friday service with the people at Christ United Methodist Church in Berwyn. As rich as those services are, they don't give us opportunities for us to get to know each other and learn from each other. **Pastor Willis Johnson** and I would like to change that. So we have some invitations for people in both faith communities.

"First, Redeemer will host a combined worship service on Martin Luther King, Jr., on <u>Sunday, Jan. 19</u>, at 10 a.m. Pastor Willis and Pastor Dave will offer a dialogue message. Following worship, there will be a potluck in Fellowship Hall with folks from both congregations seated at the tables. There will be "prompt" questions at the tables that will encourage conversation about issues surrounding issues Martin Luther King, Jr. Day bring up.

"Second, from 6:30-8 p.m. starting <u>Jan. 29-Feb. 19</u>, we will have four <u>Wednesday evening</u> discussions of the book *Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love*, by Duke University professor <u>William H. Willimon</u>. This is a short, readable book that explores how Christians are invited to engage with those society labels 'outsider' and 'stranger.' These classes will be held at Christ United Methodist (1480 Zettler Road) and on Zoom. Please go ahead and order a book yourself if you're interested in joining us. If you have difficulties with that, contact Pastor Dave.

# **BREAD: Non-Police Crisis Response System**

Since 2019, the Columbus Safety Coalition (CSC) and BREAD have advocated for a non-police crisis system to handle non-violent issues involving behavioral health, food/housing insecurity, and mediation. In February 2023, Columbus City Council allocated \$1.2 million to create a non-police alternative crisis system. However, the city



has no timeline for the beginning steps, which are to begin a pilot program and to appoint a citizen advisory panel. To apply some pressure, CSC and BREAD are planning to put an initiative on the ballot for the November 2025 election, following this timeline:

- January, 2025: File (non confusing) ballot language.
- February May, 2025: Collect signatures. The minimum needed is 25,000. Their goal is 60,000.
- November 2025: Vote on the initiative.

Lots of volunteer opportunities will start in 2025 once the attorneys have finished writing the initiative. They include:

- Collect signatures of registered Columbus voters (the signatures need to be registered Columbus voters, but the people collecting them only need to be Ohio registered voters).
  - Validate the signatures against the database.
  - Encourage people to come out on an "off year" election and vote for the initiative.

The group is comprised of many different congregations in the Columbus area which, in turn, represent many different traditions. Each of the congregations believes something different about the nature of God and the name God. But each shares a commitment to pursue justice guided by faith – to finding, in shared beliefs the strength that unity can bring.

The "Noisy Offering" is that donation of loose change that is made as one enters the Sanctuary.

# A New Exchange of the Peace cont'd from p. 1

"An insistent inner voice in me wants to dodge this history, or at least erase the weapons of destruction from its telling. That inner voice is shared by millions of others who claim to be advocates of peace. This desire to view our history minus guns is what the gun rights advocates fear – that gun disdainers will try and take away their guns and the culture in which guns are an integral part.

"It is a vicious cycle – of arrogance and self-righteousness on one side, and defensiveness and armed defense on the other. And it was at the gun show that I discovered anew my own arrogance and self-righteousness ... I have learned to temper both, and to adjust my language: instead of saying 'gun control,' which inevitably causes guns rights advocates to shift the conversation to the Second Amendment, and which ends up shutting down conversation, I now say 'gun safety.' This provides a space to potentially open up dialogue and find common ground."

I hear Bishop Beckwith inviting us to that deep listening/eavesdropping that alone helps us more deeply understand those with whom we feel completely different. What he's calling us to do reflects why our congregation's vision statement is so incredibly hard to live into: Redeemer Lutheran Church fosters understanding and healing in community. The only way we can come close to doing that is if we make sincere efforts to understand those who, if we're honest, we believe are totally wrong. And, again, if we're honest, why would we want to do that?

Bishop Beckwith answers that question by seeing a direct connection between seeking understanding across divides with the ritual we carry out each week in worship:



"Many of us worship in communities that regularly include the exchange of the peace. For me, the peace is a liturgical activity that is offered in direct response to Jesus' challenging invitation from Matthew 5:23-24: 'So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift.' (NRSV) Jesus is inviting his followers to enter a space of reconciliation, each filled with hurts and hopes, resentments and gratitude. The exchange of the peace declares that whatever separates us – and there is so much that separates us – can be overcome through the reconciling love of Christ."

How have you experienced that kind of love that can begin to heal what separates us? How have you ever been an instrument of that love, offering it to another as a way to invite a reduction in suffering? This is our Advent prayer, is it not? As we sang in our sending hymn yesterday:

O day of peace that dimly shines through all our hopes and prayers and dreams, guide us to justice, truth, and love, delivered from our selfish schemes.

May swords of hate fall from our hands, our hearts from envy find release, till by God's grace our warring world shall see Christ's promised reign of peace.

# An Advent Message from Bishop Dillahunt

**Southern Ohio Synod Bishop Suzanne Dillahunt** writes, "Gracious and Almighty God, stir our hearts and minds as we await the coming of your Son, our Savior. In this season of hope, prepare us to welcome Jesus with open hearts and renewed spirits. May his light shine brightly in our lives, guiding us in paths of peace, love, and compassion. Strengthen us to be messengers of your grace, and may all the world come to know the joy of your salvation; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

"Advent is a season of both waiting and preparing. We anticipate the celebration of Jesus' birth at Christmas while also awaiting his glorious return. As John the Baptist urged, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him" (Mark 1:3). With hearts open, we ready ourselves for the Savior of the world. Luke 3:6 reminds us, 'And all flesh shall see the salvation of God.'

"This season calls us to reflect on our identity, shaped by God's unconditional love through Jesus. "So, we pray together, 'Stir our hearts, Lord, and come, Lord Jesus.' The good news is about to be proclaimed by shepherds, angels, and through us."

#### **Prayer Concerns from ELCA**

**Dec. 10** Give thanks for siblings in Christ who accompany us on our baptismal journeys and encourage our faith and understanding of God's ways. Pray that we will not hesitate to share the gospel or to show love, concern or mercy for others, as God does for us.

11 "I wonder as I wander, out under the sky, how Jesus the Savior did come for to die for poor ordinary people like you and like I" (With One Voice 642). 13 Give praise and thanks to God for blessing us with Jesus Christ, our true Savior, Messiah, teacher, light and hope.

**14** Pray that, day after day, we will grow more generous in responding to our neighbors in need, strengthening our communities, supporting our global companions and expanding the ministries and outreach of our congregations.

15 Promise to be a faithful, generous and merciful follower of Jesus Christ, proclaiming the gospel in word and deed and doing God's work in the world.

**16** Las Posadas Las Posadas ("the Inns") is a Mexican Christmas tradition in which worshipers reenact the experience of Mary and Joseph as they searched for a place where Mary could give birth. Remembering Mary and Joseph's difficult journey, promise to embody hospitality, compassion, generosity and justice in responding to modern-day homelessness, poverty and immigration.
