

Council Adopts Policy regarding Use of Personal Images

Past President Krista Skipper reports that at the December 2024 Council meeting, a procedure for the "Use of Personal Images" by Redeemer was approved. There will now be a brief notice included in the Sunday bulletin so that people (especially guests) are aware that they may be captured during the livestreaming. Those not wanting to be captured during livestreaming could then be directed by the ushers to a seat less focused on by cameras. This procedure also puts in place an opt-out option for those who would not want their image used on the website or social media. The opt-out form has not been developed yet but will be soon. The action came at the suggestion of **Pastor Dave** after discussions with other area pastors.

Use of Personal Images by Redeemer Lutheran Church

General Procedure:

Photography and videography may be taken during church services, activities, and events for the purposes of capturing moments for the church's promotional, historical, or archival use, including but not limited to social media, newsletters, websites, or event materials.

• Opt-Out Option:

Any individual who does not wish to be included in photographs or videos may opt out by notifying the church staff or designated volunteer prior to or during the event. This may be done verbally or in writing.

• Clear Notification:

Clear communication will be provided to all members and attendees about this procedure, including signs at event entrances and announcements during services.

• Respecting Privacy:

The wishes of individuals who have opted out will be respected and honored to the best of the congregation's ability.

• Exemptions:

In cases of special services or events (e.g., weddings, funerals, community events), individuals will be made aware of photography and videography policies in advance. Additional considerations or restrictions can be made based on personal or family requests.

• Confidentiality and Use:

Every attempt will be made to use personal images in a respectful and appropriate manner to preserve the dignity and privacy of individuals.

If we get a group that is too large to work with, then we'll see who is most interested in preaching on Feb. 23 and who's open to doing this later in the year.

This would just give you an experience of doing a bit deeper dive into what you can already do. And if you've never shared a Wednesday evening reflection, so much the better! I'd love to work with you!"

Dinners Return to First English!! Redeemer to Serve Jan. 9

Kay Ernsthausen reports that, on <u>Thursday, Jan. 9</u>, Redeemer is scheduled to provide the dinner at First English. The menu, which will serve 150, includes Sloppy Joe sandwiches, individual potato chip snack bags, fruit cups, individual wrapped Hostess desserts and granola bars. There will also be lemonade and water available for the dinners. Another 70 individually wrapped desserts are needed to fill out Thursday's dinners. They can be dropped off at church by noon on Thursday.

According to Kay, "Dinner will be served from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. We will need to be at First English at between 4:30 and 4:45 p.m. We will need people to make Sloppy Joes which include two pounds of ground meat. If you are making Sloppy Joes and would like them picked up on Thursday, we have drivers who can help with this." Just let Kay know you would like a pick up.

In addition, folks to help serve are also needed. Kay is hoping to have five or six volunteers.

Following is the Sloppy Joe recipe from Kathy Mimlitch:

2 pounds lean ground beef or ground turkey

1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 cup chopped green pepper

1 tsp garlic powder

2 tsp prepared yellow mustard

- 1 1/2 cups ketchup
- 6 tsp brown sugar
- Salt and pepper to taste

In a medium skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef, onion and green pepper. Drain off liquids. Stir in garlic powder, mustard, ketchup and brown sugar. Mix thoroughly. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. This makes ~ 12 servings.

Reflections

"I usually omit the green pepper (I don't like it)! I sometimes use ketchup and barbecue sauce instead of just ketchup. I almost double the brown sugar as I like it sweet," adds Kathy.

"Thank you all for your commitment to this ministry."

Opportunities for Worship, Breaking Bread, Conversations, Book Study with Neighbors at Christ United Methodist Church

Pastor Dave writes, "Since before I came to be with Redeemer in 2017, we have been doing a Good Friday service with the people at Christ United Methodist Church in Berwyn. As rich as those services are, they don't give us opportunities for us to get to know each other and learn from each other. **Pastor Willis Johnson** and I would like to change that. So we have some invitations for people in both faith communities.

"First, Redeemer will host a combined worship service on Martin Luther King, Jr., on <u>Sunday, Jan. 19</u>, at 10 a.m. Pastor Willis and Pastor Dave will offer a dialogue message. Following worship, there will be a potluck in Fellowship Hall with folks from both congregations seated at the tables. There will be "prompt" questions at the tables that will encourage conversation about issues surrounding issues Martin Luther King, Jr. Day bring up.

"Second, from 6:30-7:45 p.m. starting <u>Jan. 29-Feb. 19</u>, we will have four <u>Wednesday evening</u> discussions of the book *Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love*, by Duke University professor William H. Willimon. This is a short, readable book that explores how Christians are invited to engage with those society labels 'outsider' and 'stranger.' These classes will be held at Christ United Methodist (1480 Zettler Road) and on Zoom. Please go ahead and order a book yourself if you're interested in joining us. Redeemer Offers Mobile Messaging Service for Urgent Info

What happens if there is an ice storm or snow and you're not sure if the church will be open for worship? Do you remember last year when we needed to cancel the worship service due to some unexpected HVAC problems?

Kristi Hildebrand reminds folks "you can sign up to receive a text message on your phone whenever there is an urgent situation regarding church.

"This service will be provided by Remind, a service that many local schools use. The schools send out important messages to their families' cell phones so the families can be notified quickly. Redeemer's **Member Care Team** would like to give this service a try here.

"It's super easy to use. Once you sign up, you don't need to do anything. To sign up, just send a text message to 81010 with the message @RLCCBUS and respond to the texts that you get back. Then, If Redeemer needs to notify you of something, the church will send you a text.

"Signing up for 'Remind' messages is totally optional, but we anticipate it will be helpful in emergencies. Click <u>here</u> for more complete directions or reach out to Kristi or **Michele Disbro** for help in signing up."

BREAD: Non-Police Crisis Response System

Since 2019, the Columbus Safety Coalition (CSC) and BREAD have advocated for a non-police crisis system to handle non-violent issues involving behavioral health, food/housing insecurity, and mediation. In February 2023, Columbus City Council allocated \$1.2 million to create a non-police alternative crisis system. However, the city has no timeline for the beginning steps, which are to begin a pilot program and to appoint a citizen advisory panel. To apply some pressure, CSC and BREAD are planning to put an initiative on the ballot for the November 2025 election, following this timeline:

- January 2025: File (non confusing) ballot language.

- February May 2025: Collect signatures. The minimum needed is 25,000. Their goal is 60,000.
- November 2025: Vote on the initiative.

Lots of volunteer opportunities will start in 2025 once the attorneys have finished writing the initiative. They include:

- Collect signatures of registered Columbus voters (the signatures need to be registered Columbus voters, but the people collecting them only need to be Ohio registered voters).

- Validate the signatures against the database.

- Encourage people to come out on an "off year" election and vote for the initiative.
