RLC, Christ United Methodist Begin Book Discussions

There is no fear in love, but perfect love drives out fear, because fear expects punishment. The person who is afraid has not been made perfect in love. We love because God first loved us. Those who say, "I love God" and hate their brothers or sisters are liars. After all, those who don't love their brothers or sisters whom they have seen can hardly love God whom they have not seen! This commandment we have from him: Those who claim to love God ought to love their brother and sister also.

1 John 4:18-21 (Common English Bible)

I remember this was one of the first New Testament passages we translated in our Greek class in seminary. The reason was simple: I John has the easiest, clearest Greek vocabulary and grammar in the New Testament. I was reminded of this when I read the introduction to *Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love*, which is the book we'll be discussing with our friends from Christ United Methodist Church **Wednesdays, Jan. 29-Feb. 19**. The author of that book, **William Willimon**, remembers his Greek professor in seminary telling the class, "In I John, the Greek is easy to read, but its message is hard to live." To which Willimon adds, "And how."

I've been told that the most common command in both testaments of the Bible is some form of "Don't be afraid." Which means the people who wrote the stories in the Bible knew how much fear is part of our lives, and they knew that when our lives are driven by fear, there is no way we can love. So if the central command of Jesus is to love God with every part of our being, to love our neighbor, and to love ourselves, then we have to discover ways to address head-on the fear that robs us of the ability to love.

Naming this fear and exploring ways to lessen its power over us is what this book group book is all about. This book invites us to address a notion that generates a fair amount of our fear: who and what we label as the Other. Whom do we define as so different from us by the ways they live, speak, look, love, view the world and how it should be, that we name them as the Other, because it is hard for us to name anything we have in common with them?

I believe all of us have at least one person or group to whom we give the label the Other. We might feel embarrassed by that or might feel like followers of Jesus shouldn't do that. But that doesn't mean we don't do it. And unless we have the honesty and courage to name who that is for us, we will never be able to see them in new ways that might free us from our fear or hatred of them.

Opportunities for Worship, Breaking Bread, Conversations, Book Study with Neighbors at Christ United Methodist Church

Pastor Dave writes, “Since before I came to be with Redeemer in 2017, we have been doing a Good Friday service with the people at Christ United Methodist Church in Berwyn. As rich as those services are, they don’t give us opportunities for us to get to know each other and learn from each other. Pastor Willis Johnson and I would like to change that. So we have some invitations for people in both faith communities.

“First, Redeemer will host a combined worship service on Martin Luther King, Jr., on **Sunday, Jan. 19**, at 10 a.m. Pastor Willis and Pastor Dave will offer a dialogue message. Following worship, there will be a potluck in Fellowship Hall with folks from both congregations seated at the tables. There will be “prompt” questions at the tables that will encourage conversation about issues surrounding issues Martin Luther King, Jr. Day bring up.

“Second, from 6:30-7:45 p.m. starting **Jan. 29-Feb. 19**, we will have four **Wednesday evening** discussions of the book *Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love*, by Duke University professor **William H. Willimon**. This is a short, readable book that explores how Christians are invited to engage with those society labels ‘outsider’ and ‘stranger.’ These classes will be held at Christ United Methodist (1480 Zettler Road) and on Zoom. Please go ahead and order a book yourself if you’re interested in joining us. If you have difficulties with that, contact Pastor Dave.

Sunday Adult Forum on Hiatus for Two Weeks, Then Will Discuss Church's Call to Respond to Sexual Violence

The Sunday Adult Forum is on hiatus for the next two weeks, **Sundays, Jan. 19** and **Jan. 26**. Then beginning **Sunday, Feb. 2 Staci Stought**, a seminary student and a retired sexual assault police officer, will be offering a four week Bible study on how churches can be a beacon of healing and hope to the harm of sexual violence within our world. Her class goes beyond traditional boundary training to explore the transformative role of faith communities.

“We will learn how to affirm the sacred worth of every person through the exploration of sex and gender in the Bible, the prevalence of sexual violence, and practical strategies. Discover how the church can cultivate a culture of compassion, foster self-worth in survivors, and embody Christ's call to love and justice.”

Staci currently works as a pastoral care minister at Messiah Lutheran Church, and is also a trauma program manager at Grant Hospital, giving care and advocacy to co-victims of homicide due to gender-based violence.

“Please note that the final class in this series will be on **March 2**, since Staci is out-of-town for seminary classes in Minneapolis the last week of February.”

Redeemer Offers Mobile Messaging Service for Urgent Info

What happens if there is an ice storm or snow and you're not sure if the church will be open for worship? Do you remember last year when we needed to cancel the worship service due to some unexpected HVAC problems?

Kristi Hildebrand reminds folks “you can sign up to receive a text message on your phone whenever there is an urgent situation regarding church.

“This service will be provided by Remind, a service that many local schools use. The schools send out important messages to their families' cell phones so the families can be notified quickly. Redeemer's **Member Care Team** would like to give this service a try here.

“It's super easy to use. Once you sign up, you don't need to do anything. To sign up, just send a text message to 81010 with the message @RLCCBUS and respond to the texts that you get back. Then, If Redeemer needs to notify you of something, the church will send you a text.

BREAD Update: Non-Police Crisis Response Solution

Kristi Hildebrand reports that, “The Columbus Safety Coalition (CSC) and members of BREAD are actively working on a ballot initiative for the November 2025 election. **Helen Anne Sweeney**, one of the leaders, will be sharing information about this initiative on **Sunday, February 23** during Redeemer's Adult Ed Forum.

“The vision for the Non-Police Crisis Response Solution is for Columbus to have a coordinated and connected system where non-police teams can be dispatched to calls for non-violent issues involving behavioral health, food/housing insecurity, and mediation. The teams will consist of trained social workers and peer supporters and be available 24x7.

“Columbus currently has some of the ingredients for this, such as mobile response units, but they are not available 24 hours a day or 7 days a week. Columbus also does not have a smooth connection between 911 and 988 (Suicide & Crisis Lifeline).

“In February 2023, Columbus City Council allocated \$1.2 million to create a non-police alternative crisis system, which shows that they believe in this approach. However, the city has no timeline for the beginning steps, which are to begin a pilot program and to appoint a citizen advisory panel. To apply some pressure for council to follow through, CSC is planning to put an initiative on the ballot for the next election, following this timeline:

- March, 2025: File (non confusing) ballot language
- March – July, 2025: Collect & validate 25,000 – 75,000 signatures.
- November 2025: Vote on the initiative

“Lots of volunteer opportunities will start in 2025 once the attorneys have finished writing the initiative.

- Collect signatures of registered Columbus voters
- Validate the signatures. (Training will be provided & this can be done from home).
- Encourage people to come out on an “off year” election and vote for the initiative
- Vote yourself

That is the hope that **Pastor Willis Johnson** and I have for our four weeks of exploring this book together. We hope we can read about the Other, share our stories, and explore our fears and the ways we have moved beyond those fears to unlock love and healing. Naming our fears and beginning to take power from them, and imagining letting go of our pattern of naming those we fear or hate as the Other, is what you’re invited to do through this study.

We will begin this journey together this coming **Sunday, Jan. 19** when the members of Christ United Methodist Church will join us here for a shared Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday worship service. Pastor Willis and I will reflect on the idea of the Other in the context of Jesus’ Love Command. Choirs from both congregations will lead worship. Afterwards, we will share a potluck in the Fellowship Hall. You will be seated at tables of six, with tablemates from both congregations, so you can start to get to know each other and explore the theme of the Other. At your tables, you will be invited to share your responses to this question:

At some point, we discover that not everyone looks like us, believes like us, and lives like we do. When did you first really realize you were “other” in significant ways? How did realizing that affect you around the time you made this discovery? How is that experience still shaping you today?

This is a beautiful chance to start to get to know the folks we worship with every Good Friday, and honor the legacy of the **Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.** and his commitment to neighbor love by exploring our own fears, who the Other is for us, and how we might imagine letting go of some of our fear, so the love which creates the Beloved Community might more freely flow through us.

The book group will meet **Wednesday evenings, Jan. 29-Feb. 19**, from 6:30-7:45 p.m. at Christ United Methodist Church, 1480 Zettler Road. You can join in person or through Zoom. Bishop Eaton Addresses Wildfires, Suggests Contributions to LDR

Bishop Elizabeth Eaton writes, “The images of leaping flames, smoke-choked skies, and the wreckage of homes and habitats in and around Los Angeles are hard to bear. The ongoing, deadly California wildfires have claimed lives, displaced hundreds of thousands of people, and destroyed homes, businesses, schools and houses of worship. The devastation continues as winds spread the flames. So far we know that **Bishop Brenda Bos** of the Southwest California Synod and her wife, **Janis**, lost their home in the Eaton fire. We believe that the fires have touched the lives of many more ELCA members and several congregations as the synod continues to receive damage reports and assess the immediate needs for support.

“The prophet Isaiah writes that even when fires rage, the final word is faith, not fear. God redeems us and calls us by name to be agents of healing and hope, even amid staggering loss. In faith, we respond through prayer, accompaniment and action.

“Please join me in praying that God’s love and care be manifest among all who are impacted by these wildfires. Pray for the firefighters battling unrelenting blazes and for first responders, health care providers and public servants providing safety and support for those impacted. Pray for ELCA ministries as they care for the many needs of their communities. Pray for the long-term well-being of all who are affected by the widespread devastation and who face ongoing danger.”

She went on to suggest that folks can help by contributing to Lutheran Disaster Relief (LDR). “Gifts to ‘U.S. Wildfires’ will be used in full to assist those affected by wildfires until the response is complete. 20 Martin Luther King Jr. Day Remember and give thanks for the life, teaching and advocacy of **Martin Luther King Jr.** for the sake of justice, inclusion and the value of all people, especially those who suffer persecution, racism, disdain or oppression. Pray that we will be inspired by our neighbors and siblings in Christ who are fearless and persistent in their advocacy and compassion for others.
