In his first week in office, President Donald Trump has issued executive orders and called for policy changes affecting refugees, asylum seekers, and people in this country who do not have documentation to be here legally. The last comprehensive immigration reform bill to become law was almost 40 years ago. This bill, signed into law in 1986 by President Ronald Reagan, made it illegal to hire or recruit illegal immigrants, while also legalizing some 2.7 million undocumented residents who entered the United States before 1982. Since then, elected officials and the White House have decided there isn't enough political gain to make the hard choices required to deal with the realities facing this country and the larger world.

The bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in the Northwest part of the United States recently issued a statement about immigration. As the bishops write, "It reflects how the teachings of the Bible and the Lutheran tradition can inform how we think about immigration and the individuals who are immigrants." Below is the text of their statement. If any of you would like to get together to talk further about these or any issues that are on your mind, please let me know.

A Statement on Immigration

As Lutherans, we are called to live out the teachings of Jesus Christ, who welcomed strangers and emphasized love, mercy, and justice for all people. We believe that every human being, regardless of their country of origin or legal status, is created in the image of God and has inherent dignity and worth. This foundational truth compels us to approach the issue of immigration with compassion and a commitment to the common good.

Scripture repeatedly instructs us to love our neighbor and show the stranger hospitality. God commands the people of Israel, "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself" (Leviticus 19:34). Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) shows us that caring for people in need is central to who we are as Christians. The parable also challenges us to acknowledge the goodness in all people because the "foreigner" in the story is the one who acts in the most Christlike way. In light of these teachings, we advocate for an immigration policy that reflects Christ's love, recognizing that all people deserve respect and protection.

The Lutheran tradition emphasizes both mercy and justice. Justice requires everyone, including immigrants, to be treated fairly and equitably. While upholding the rule of law is important, it must not be done in ways that dehumanize or exploit vulnerable people. We are especially concerned about the possibility that places of worship, hospitals, and schools could be the target of deportation raids. A policy that allowed such raids would increase the suffering not only of undocumented people but also of many people who would fear being unjustly targeted and thus avoid those places.

Redeemer Holds Annual Meeting

Last Sunday, Redeemer held the annual meeting, followed by a potluck lunch.

We recognized and thanked outgoing Congregational Leaders, Council President Krista Skipper, Treasurer Julie Johnson, Secretary Sue Watson, Member Support Elyce Herring, Outreach Diane Brobeck, Education Katie Jacobs, Special Funds Team Chair Dave Engel, Mutual Ministries Team Margie Farnham and Mutual Ministries Team Emlyn Ott.

Ashley Bird was elected Council Vice President. We elected voting members to attend the Southern Ohio Synod Assembly, Wendy Stoica and Scott Steiner. The alternates elected were, Julie Johnson and Brad Phillips.

The 2025 Leadership Team was introduced: Elected by the Congregation to Council: President Brad Binau, Vice President Ashley Bird, Finance Officer Laura Warren, Secretary Rich Pautsch, Education Karen Rider, Member Support Kathy Mimplitch, Outreach Mary Benis, Property April Smith, Stewardship Kathy Denard, Worship Michelle Clemence.

Elected by Congregation to the Special Funds Team: Wendy Stoica Chair, Ashley Bird, John Kennedy, Julie Boreman, and Terry Warren.

Appointed by Congregation Council: Treasurer Kay Ernsthausen.

The Spending Plan (Budget) was discussed. Laura Warren provided a brief summary of significant items in the plan. It was noted that the congregation has plans to replace the fence on the West side of the parking lot and to repave the parking lot. Estimated Costs of \$84,000 will be covered by the \$65,000 in the Building Fund, with the rest coming from general operating funds. The Spending Plan was adopted.

General Announcements:

The Use of Personal Images Policy adopted by Council in December of 2024 has been put on hold, pending resolution of how to incorporate our live streaming ministry into the policy.

Mary Benis of the Member Support team drew attention to the statistical report and the number of people who have been removed from the Redeemer membership roles. She explained that it had been a number of years since this process had taken place. This year members of Member Support wrote personal letters to those who had not been involved in any way at Redeemer for several years, letting them know they were missed and asking if they'd like to remain members or not. If there was no response, Member Support looked over the names again and then made the decision to remove them from our membership roles. Mary said in the future Member Support will do this on a more regular basis. Brad Binau noted that this information is important to the Synod office for their research.

Solar Panels were discussed by Julie Johnson. Up front cost would be in the area of \$130,000, with Federal money available after the installation to offset about \$30,000 of that cost. Julie noted that the electric bill some months approaches \$1700, and that our roofs are well positioned to use Solar Panels. Julie invited anyone interested to talk to her.

A motion to Adjourn was made and seconded. The motion was adopted. The meeting adjourned at 11:34.

The property team is investigating improving the accessibility of the main first floor bathrooms. This has been talked about for quite a while and we are moving forward with this.

The church received a gift of \$5,000 from Charles Bruce. Some of you may remember Mr. Bruce. He was a charter member of Redeemer. His gift will, at the request of his family, be earmarked for the Building and Equipment Fund.

The Personal Images policy adopted by Council last December has been put on hold pending reconsideration of the policy in view of the live streaming of the services.

Council asks that when making announcements after worship that people identify themselves and their role related to the announcement.

Super Bowl Is Coming Feb. 9! So Is RLC’s Souper Bowl!

As in the past, Redeemer will continue to collect money and canned goods on Super Bowl Sunday – **Feb. 9** – to benefit the Lutheran Social Services (LSS) Food Pantries. (Any additional money contributed in February, as well as any canned goods will get to the pantry.)

Ben Powers, LSS congregational relations manager, reminds folks that with the Food Pantry’s buying power, each \$1 donated will be able to purchase \$4 worth of food. He also said the best soups to collect are tomato, chicken noodle, and vegetable. The most needed items, in addition to the soup, are **16-oz.** plastic jars of peanut butter or any approximately 15 oz. size **canned fruit**. However, the LSS Food Pantries will be able to use *any and all* collected food items.

What is the 2025 goal? According to Ben, “Last year we had 26 churches participate in raising over \$21,000 and collecting more than 4,200 lbs. of food! This year, our goal is to have 30 churches participate, raise more than \$30,000 and collect over 4,000 lbs. of food! Thank you for your participation.”

Let’s see what Redeemer can do!

Sunday Adult Forum Will Discuss Church’s Call to Respond to Sexual Violence

Beginning on **Sunday, Feb. 2**, the Sunday Adult Forum welcomes **Staci Stought**, a seminary student and a retired sexual assault police officer, who will be offering a four week Bible study on how churches can be a beacon of healing and hope to the harm of sexual violence within our world. Her class goes beyond traditional boundary training to explore the transformative role of faith communities.

“We will learn how to affirm the sacred worth of every person through the exploration of sex and gender in the Bible, the prevalence of sexual violence, and practical strategies. Discover how the church can cultivate a culture of compassion, foster self-worth in survivors, and embody Christ’s call to love and justice.”

Staci currently works as a pastoral care minister at Messiah Lutheran Church, and is also a trauma program manager at Grant Hospital, giving care and advocacy to co-victims of homicide due to gender-based violence.

“Please note that the final class in this series will be on **March 2**, since Staci is out-of-town for seminary classes in Minneapolis the last week of February.”

A Statement on Immigration *cont'd from p. 1*

Denying people the opportunity to attend worship, be educated, or receive medical treatment violates individuals' fundamental rights. We urge those in government and law enforcement who are responsible for the detention or deportation of undocumented persons to consider how their actions might be seen in the eyes of God.

We are all members of the same human family. Therefore, we approach immigration not merely as a political or legal issue but as a matter of human solidarity. The health and prosperity of the United States are intertwined with the contributions and lives of immigrants. Immigrants bring diverse gifts and play an essential role in our communities and economies. Our immigration policies should reflect a commitment to the welfare of all, especially the most vulnerable.

As people who have received God's mercy and grace, we are called to extend that same mercy and grace to others. This means offering opportunities for new beginnings, particularly for those already present in the United States without legal documentation. A just immigration policy would provide pathways to citizenship for those who have lived in the U.S. for years, contributing to the country and integrating into our communities. It should also guarantee protection for those fleeing violence or persecution, ensure that immigrant families remain united, and make sure that children are not punished for their parents' actions.

We are called, as individuals and as a society, to remember that the immigrants among us are not intruders or enemies but bearers of the image of God, deserving of our care, respect, and advocacy

Bishop Dillahunt Message to the Southern Ohio Synod

Bishop Susan Dillahunt writes, “We are exactly one month away from our Christmas Eve celebrations, where we welcomed God's presence in our midst as a baby—the long-anticipated messiah, whose life, ministry, death, resurrection, and ascension continue to guide us in our faith today.

My office has received questions about the safety and security of church buildings as changes occur with immigration policies in the United States. There is a lot of misinformation, unfounded rhetoric, and unclear policies being communicated, increasing the fear of the unknown. As we navigate this together, I wanted to share with you some resources to assist the ministries in the Southern Ohio Synod—congregations, campus ministries, food pantries, schools, and preschools. Your ministries are vital to the communities you serve. Below are some beginning resources that can help you:

- **Global Refuge** (formerly known as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services or LIRS) website is a good starting point. Their resource page is linked [here](#).
- **Accompanying Migrants with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities** (AMMPARO) is an ELCA Ministry, under the larger ministry of ELCA Advocacy. You may learn more about their ministry [here](#) and access their resources [here](#).

Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust: *Update and Input*

The ELCA reports on the reconsideration of the church's 2009 social statement, Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust which Redeemer discussed at length in several Sunday Adult Forums. A task force seated by the ELCA Church Council has been hard at work since Spring 2024 on this first reconsideration. The draft edits from the task force are now available online for public feedback [here](#). The public comment period runs until **Jan. 31, 2025**.

Prayer Concerns from ELCA

Jan 27 Remember in prayer youth, adults and families involved in service learning and mission trips throughout the year. Pray that they might share the gospel, serve their neighbors in need, participate in the work of global companions and ecumenical partners, and respond to the unique contexts and needs of communities.

28 Remember in prayer neighbors and siblings in Christ who suffer poverty, homelessness and hunger, that their hope will be sustained, their daily needs met and their human dignity respected.

29 “The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul; the decrees of the Lord are sure, making wise the simple; the precepts of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart” (Psalm 19:7-8). Give thanks for the word of God, for it is trustworthy and restores us, imparts wisdom, and stirs joy and gratitude in our hearts.

30 Pray for an end to conflicts and violence in the world, including in our own communities. Ask the Spirit to inspire and equip us to be peacemakers and bearers of hope.

31 Give thanks for Women of the ELCA (WELCA) and its ministry with women to encourage bold and active faith in Jesus Christ, promote healing and wholeness, address injustices, discover spiritual gifts, and encourage and equip leaders.

Feb 1 *World Interfaith Harmony Week (U.N.)* Ask the Spirit to help congregations create opportunities for dialogue and learning with people whose religious beliefs and traditions are different from our own, for the sake of peace, harmony, cooperation and mutual understanding.

2 The word of God brings joy and comfort to us yet is sometimes difficult to hear. Pray that we will reflect on how God's word strikes us, especially when it challenges what is safe, familiar and comfortable in our lives.
