## Trump Advisors Target Lutheran Agencies

Sunday morning, **Pastor Dave** opened the worship service with the following update on developments by the Trump administration and advisor **Elon Musk** with regard to Lutheran charitable organizations:

“Grace and peace to you from the God who calls us to love the powerless and the hated with an especially fierce kind of love. We need to show that kind of love in these days.

“Last week, **Michael Flynn**, who was a national security advisor during **President Donald Trump’s** first term, accused a number of Lutheran organizations of using “‘religion’” as a money laundering operation.’ Although the focus of his attack seemed to be on immigrant and refugee assistance, the Lutheran-supported programs he targeted also assist with foster care, adoption, Head Start, food pantries, elder care, and resources for victims of domestic abuse. Flynn pledged to ‘examine them all and shut them down.’ Presidential advisor **Elon Musk** retweeted Flynn’s statements. He said he and his team would be ‘rapidly shutting down these illegal payments.’

“Neither man offered proof of any illegal payments.

“In response, our presiding bishop, **Elizabeth Eaton** said, ‘The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America remains steadfast in our commitment and work with our many Lutheran partners and expressions of our church – work we have done with legally-admitted refugees and immigrants for 85 years. Our call to love our neighbors as ourselves remains steadfast. Be of good courage, Church. Let us persevere.’ More than one pastor in this country has called Christians’ support for immigrants and refugees “the sin of empathy.”

“We must remember who we follow and how Jesus calls us to live. The hymn we are about to sing [“Will You Come and Follow Me?”] reminds us of what a life following **Jesus** looks like. And if some religious and political leaders in our country say empathy is a sin, then, truly, we who follow Jesus must sin boldly.

“One way we resist cruelty and fear is by coming together for worship. One way we show our good courage and persevere as followers of Jesus is to sing with one voice about the Jesus whose compassion and justice we will never stop trying to make real. In body or spirit, please stand and face the cross as we unite our voices in resistance and praise.”

### **Brewing Faith Meets Tuesday on Zoom**

The Brewing Faith small group will meet **Tuesday, Feb. 11** at 6:30 p.m. via Zoom. This week’s conversation topic, from **Rich Pautsch**, is “Have you ever had an epiphany? What happened? Were you alone or in a group? What did you learn? How did it feel?”

Rich writes there are different types of epiphanies:

- **“Personal:** A sudden realization about yourself, such as understanding a long-standing emotional pattern, discovering your true desires.
- **“Intellectual:** A moment of sudden clarity or understanding such as grasping a difficult concept in science, philosophy or literature.

- **“Creative:** A moment of inspiration in art, writing, music or other creative field, where a new idea emerges out of nowhere.
- **“Spiritual:** A deep realization about the nature of God or your spiritual path.
- **“Moral:** A realization about right and wrong, leading to a shift in ethical values, recognizing bias or understanding the suffering of another.
- **“Relational:** A realization about the true nature of a relationship.
- **“Existential:** An insight about your purpose or meaning in your life”

## Sunday Adult Forum Continues Look at Church’s Response to Sexual Violence

The Sunday Adult Forum welcomes **Staci Stought**, a seminary student and a retired sexual assault police officer, who will be offering a Bible study on how churches can be a beacon of healing and hope to the harm of sexual violence within our world for three more weeks. Her class, which began this past Sunday, goes beyond traditional boundary training to explore the transformative role of faith communities.

“We will learn how to affirm the sacred worth of every person through the exploration of sex and gender in the Bible, the prevalence of sexual violence, and practical strategies. Discover how the church can cultivate a culture of compassion, foster self-worth in survivors, and embody Christ’s call to love and justice.”

Staci currently works as a pastoral care minister at Messiah Lutheran Church and is also a trauma program manager at Grant Hospital, giving care and advocacy to co-victims of homicide due to gender-based violence.

“Please note that the final class in this series will be on **March 2**, since Staci is out-of-town for seminary classes in Minneapolis the last week of February.”

## Solar Panels Explored for Redeemer

**Julie Johnson** reports that last fall the Property Team contacted two companies who install solar panels to find out what would be involved, and what the approximate cost would be to install solar panels on the building. This idea first was raised at least 10 years ago, but the decision was made to not pursue solar because we had teenagers at night who were getting on the roof by climbing on the air conditioning unit in the playground. When that unit had to be replaced, it was moved to the garden area.

The Property Team decided to look into this in light of rising utility prices, especially electric. Redeemer uses more electricity in warm weather because of air conditioning. One month last summer, the church’s electric bill was \$1,700. In addition, there is now a federal benefit for nonprofits such as churches.

Both companies that the team spoke to prepared plans and cost estimates. The upfront costs of installing a full array of solar panels was just over \$130,000. Since a nonprofit doesn’t pay taxes the federal credit comes later - several months later. Redeemer would get a little over \$30,000 back.

“We will continue to explore how churches are doing this and ways that could assist in upfront costs. If you are interested in exploring this with us, please contact Julie. It would also be helpful to know if members are generally supportive of this or not.”

### **Bishop Dillahunt Message to the Southern Ohio Synod**

**Bishop Susan Dillahunt** writes, “My office has received questions about the safety and security of church buildings as changes occur with immigration policies in the United States. There is a lot of misinformation, unfounded rhetoric, and unclear policies being communicated, increasing the fear of the unknown. As we navigate this together, I wanted to share with you some resources to assist the ministries in the Southern Ohio Synod—congregations, campus ministries, food pantries, schools, and preschools. Your ministries are vital to the communities you serve. Below are some beginning resources that can help you:

## Prayer Concerns from ELCA

Ask the Spirit to sustain their faith, inspire their joy in ministry and equip them with gifts and skills for serving in diverse and challenging contexts.

**15** Pray for peace, healing and justice, especially in the critical contexts of Ukraine, Russia, Haiti, the Middle East, troubled regions of Africa and wherever conflict and war exist in the world.

**16** Remember in prayer those impacted by the wildfires in Southern California and by severe winter weather, and those involved in long-term recovery from disasters. Give thanks for Lutheran Disaster Response and for synods and congregations that provide financial support, resources, volunteers and encouragement.
