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Placing the Ashes

Ashes remind us we come from dust, and we will return to dust. The name *Adam* means *dust creature*. For a season we live as dust creatures, born to love and be loved, born to sing and be sung, born to weep, and laugh, and wonder, and heal. After a season, we die into whatever mystery our Creator has in mind.

The ashes we will wear remind us we will die.

What glorious dust we are! For the dust in us is the same dust that makes up the stars which shine on us and bring us to open-mouthed wonder. The dust in us is billions of years old. It connects us to all that is, all that has come before us, and all that is yet to be. God blew life into this dust, forming us into the image of Divine love and naming us *Very Good*.

The ashes we will wear remind us we are beloved stardust.

The dust of too many places around the world is mixed with ashes of the bodies and dreams and possibilities of too many of God's children killed because too many people with power and too many of the rest of us have chosen to worship the gods of violence, fear, and ignorance.

The ashes we will wear remind us of all those who are dead-too-young because throughout history, we humans have been too afraid to defend lives whom the powerful have named *heretic*, *enemy*, *different*, *unwanted*, *unneeded*, *unlovable*, *less-than-human*.

Mortal ... Glorious ... Afraid: The ashes we will wear remind us we are all of these.

And they remind us we are so much more. The ashes we will wear remind us we are followers of the Jesus who came so all creation might have life and all creation might know joy. *Life* and *joy*: The call of these ashes in the lives of all who choose to wear them.

From dust were you made; to dust you shall return.

Matthew 6:1-6, 19-21 (New Living Translation, inclusivized)

- [Jesus said to his followers], "Watch out! Don't do your good deeds publicly, to be admired by others, for you will lose the reward from your Abba in heaven. When you give to someone in need, don't do as the hypocrites do—blowing trumpets in the streets to call attention to their acts of charity! I tell you the truth, they have received all the reward they will ever get. But when you give to someone in need, don't let your left hand know what your right hand is doing. Give your gifts in private, and your Abba, who sees everything, will reward you.
- "When you pray, don't be like the hypocrites who love to pray publicly on street corners where everyone can see them. I tell you the truth, that is all the reward they will ever get. But when you pray, go away by yourself, shut the door behind you, and pray in private. Then your Abba, who sees everything, will reward you...."
- "And when you fast, don't make it obvious, as the hypocrites do, for they try to look miserable and disheveled so people will admire them for their fasting. I tell you the truth, that is the only reward they will ever get. But when you fast, comb your hair and wash your face. Then no one will notice that you are fasting, except your Abba, who knows what you do in private, and will reward you.
- "Don't store up treasures here on earth, where moths eat them and rust destroys them, and where thieves break in and steal. Store your treasures in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be."

In the valley I walk in a pasture so green With a river so deep and so wide, A valley more beautiful than I have ever seen. I walk with the Lord as my guide.



Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

We thank you, Desert Mother, that, in the valley of dry bones, you create hearts of flesh quickened by the Spirit's breath. We thank you, Chosen One, that you empty yourself of might and glory and set your face towards the fickle crowd, the cruel empire, the fear of abandonment. We thank you, Holy Wisdom, that you walk in cloud and fire with your people as we struggle to follow. We welcome you as the God whose cross confronts the violence of the world and reveals another wisdom outside the city walls. Most of all, we thank you for forgiving and healing us of everything broken and breaking within our lives. Strengthen us that we might take up your work of selfless love, liberating honesty, and compassionate care for all.

Now, Ever-loving One, we open to receive your Holy Spirit in us and in these gifts: that these fragile, earthly things may be to us the Body and Blood of Jesus; who, on the night that he was betrayed, gathered with his faltering friends for a meal that tasted of freedom. Calling them to his table, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is broken for you. Do this to remember me." In the same way after supper, he took the cup, saying: "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood. It is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do so to remember me." As on that night, so here and now he offers himself in touch and taste beyond all words can hold.

Therefore, we come to him in whom all is created in heaven and earth, whose cross and resurrection make all things new, and who teaches us to pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

Whoever you are, from wherever you come, whatever you believe, you are welcome and invited to receive. Come! For all things are now ready.


