Death, Dying, and Grieving - Adult Education in March

Ash Wednesday will launch Redeemer into Lenten reflection on our mortality and God's promise to bring life out of death. **Emily Kent** and **Brad Binau** will explore these themes for three Sundays in March in an adult education class, "Death, Dying, and Grieving."

March 9 - Death: Grieving our Losses.

All our losses are a kind of death and all our losses require grief work. We will name and explore different kinds of losses and the fundamentals of good grief work that can result in remembering with less pain.

March 16 - Dying: Experiencing Physical Death

"End-of-life doulas" have special gifts to help us become more comfortable with our own mortality and navigate end-of-life issues for ourselves and those we love. We will explore our attitudes about bodies and how we care for them at the end of life and after death.

March 23 - Grieving: Remembering Life

Good grief work can help us remember the past with less pain and anticipate the future hopefully -- some theologians call this "remembering the future." We will explore funeral and burial practices and how they can facilitate or impede how we remember. We will discuss the role of Redeemer's Remembrance Garden as part of the congregation's mission and ministry.

Redeemer to Serve at First English March 13

Kay Ernsthausen reports that, on <u>Thursday, March 13</u>, Redeemer is scheduled to provide the dinner at First English. The menu, which will serve 150, includes Sloppy Joe sandwiches, tater tots, green beans, individually wrapped cookies or brownies. It runs from 4:30 to 7 p.m. Servers are also needed.

Kay notes that the frozen tater tots can be placed in the freezer either upstairs or in the downstairs kitchen. The frozen green beans should be cut beans and in the largest package available. She is looking to prepare meals for 150 people.

Following is the Sloppy Joe recipe from Kathy Mimlitch:

- 2 pounds lean ground beef or ground turkey
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 2 tsp prepared yellow mustard
- 1 1/2 cups ketchup
- 6 tsp brown sugar
- Salt and pepper to taste

In a medium skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef, onion and green pepper. Drain off liquids. Stir in garlic powder, mustard, ketchup and brown sugar. Mix thoroughly. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Recipe can be made with turkey. This makes ~ 12 servings.

A Call to Support CRIS Ohio

Julie Johnson writes that the Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS) is an nonprofit agency in Central Ohio that provides a variety of services to refugees and immigrants. It is an affiliate of Church World Services (which Redeemer support each fall through CROP Walk – see separate story, this issue on CROP Walk).

Among other activities it is a refugee resettlement (as an affiliate of CWS) and has a cooperative agreement with the U.S. State Department to directly receive and place refugees in our community. It has been in existence for 30 years and has earned the respect of many who advocate for immigrants and refugees.

CRIS offers a variety of services in addition to resettlement services including legal services, family services, employment services, health and wellness services and youth mentorship services.

"CRIS has been immensely impacted by executive orders signed by **President Trump**. On his first day in office, he signed an executive order that stopped the arrival of refugees. This included persons who had been through all background checks, interviews and other steps required and who had even booked transportation. For four days the U.S government issued a stop work order, halting CRIS's work with other refugees. CRIS was also impacted when Trump signed an executive order halting government funding of grants and loans.

"Supporting CRIS is an action that we can take now to support immigrants and refugees in our area in a hostile and chaotic time. The quickest way to support CRIS is directly through either their website at <u>crisohio.org</u> or by calling 614-235-5747. You can also donate by writing a check to Redeemer and note in the memo line CRIS. Donations through Redeemer are usually delayed by at least a month."

10 Give thanks for moments of joy and celebration in your life and the lives of your neighbors and siblings in Christ.
